WHAT suckers these nazis must think we Americans are—one of them is quoted as follows: "Hess would never have engineered a revolt against Hitler, and I do not hold with the theory that he made his flight to escape liquidation. He has too many claims on Hitler to be in danger."

Obviously "claims on Hitler" would be the best reason in the world for rubbing out the claimant.

Southwestern Oregon has not been represented on the supreme court of the state of Oregon for so many years that no one here can remember when. For this reason, as well as for the reason that Judge James T. Brand is a distinguished citizen and an excellent jurist, his appointment by Governor Sprague to fill the vacancy on the court created by the death of Judge Bean is generally approved in this area.

It should be pretty plain now to pickpockets in general, and Gypsy pickpockets in particular, that this is a very unhealthy county in which to conduct such operations. command's inside war plans is a real worry for the Germans. Surprise is one of the most important elements in warfare. If the other fellow knows exactly what you are going to do and is ALL SET FOR IT, you are at a distinct disadvantage.

It is entirely possible that as a result of Hess' flight to Scotland the German high command may have to change its plans at the last moment.

HITLER and his generals may even THINK Hess didn't know the inside plans. But they

can't be SURE. There is the disconcerting possibility that he may have known more than they thought he knew.
You can be sure they're worried.

MEANWHILE we have today the statement that France's Vichy government (represented at some sort of conference by Admiral Darlan) and Hitler have got together on terms of "co-operation" between Germany and France.

What the terms are is not divulged, but they are pretty certain to include French help for Hitler in the Mediterranean and Africa.

Eugene Singers Dated Here to Aid Swim Pool Fund

The Women's Choral club of Eugene, one of the state's best known singing groups, will be presented in formal concert at Roseburg senior high school auditorium at 8 p. m. Monday, June 2, it was announced here today. The program is being arranged and sponsored by the Roseburg Men's Glee club as a benefit for the municipal swimming pool fund.

The Eugene Choral club consists of more than 60 members, most of whom have been singing together for about 10 years. The organization was first directed by John Stark Evans, professor of music at University of Oregon, who is chief advisor for the club. Mr. Evans is well known to Roseburg music lovers. He was the first director of the Roseburg Men's Glee club and has also appeared here in organ concerts.

The director of the Eugene club is Cora Moore Frey, accompanist for the famous Eugene Glee men.

The women have been visiting various cities of Oregon for the past few years, appearing in benefit concerts and have been well received. Albany and Marshfield recently enjoyed concerts by the club. The organization is a non-profit singing society and asks nothing for its services. All proceeds from the concert here, aside from the small expense will be turned over to the swimming pool fund.

Tickets are now on sale by all members of the Men's Glee club and also may be purchased at Goetts Variety store and the Film Shop.

Proposed Soft Drink Tax Held Blow to Business

Local soft drink manufacturers are much concerned about the proposal of the treasury department that a federal tax of 1¢ be placed on soft drinks, according to E. T. Unrath of the Coca-Cola Bottling company, of this city.

Mr. Unrath says "those of us who are engaged in the sale of soft drinks are willing and glad to pay our share of the national defense program, but by segregating a food product, such as ours, from all other foods for a special tax of the type proposed, the bottler and fountain, and other retailers as well, face the problem of rising of costs and decreasing sales."

"The fraction-of-a-cent margin of earnings on bottled soft drinks, for example, makes it impossible for the manufacturer to absorb a one-cent tax, and raising of the retail price to cover the tax will cause a severe decrease in soft drink consumption and sales, affecting all who sell soft drinks. After all, the principal consumers of soft drinks are the children and wage-earners of the nation. To them 20 per cent is a heavy rate of tax on a five-cent item."

Army Planes to Scout Treks Through Roseburg

Army planes will be in evidence over Roseburg almost constantly each forenoon next week, as a result of an order issued yesterday for aerial traffic patrols during the big troop movement south from Fort Lewis and Camp Murray.

Army officers announced that fliers of the 91st and 116th observation squadrons would patrol the troop caravans on highways 97 and 99, keeping check on any lagging trucks, traffic problems

ahead, proper spacing, etc. The movement of the 3rd and 41st divisions will involve 3,400 army trucks. The plane patrols will be in radio communication at all times with the column commanders. It is expected that a number of the army planes will be based each night at the local airport, as it is planned to maintain bases nightly near the camps of the truck columns.

Clinic for Crippled Children Dated Here

Plans for a clinic for crippled children were made here Thursday at a conference held by Miss Alyce Bloom of Portland with officers, nurses and social service workers cooperating in the Douglas County Public Health association and public welfare commission. Miss Bloom, who is associated with the crippled children's division of the state health association, outlined plans for the clinic, which was set for the date of June 19 at the courthouse in Roseburg.

Dr. Mountford Promoted To Inspector Position

Dr. A. H. Mountford, chief medical officer at the veterans administration facility here, today received notice of promotion to the position of medical supervisor and hospital inspector at the central office of the veterans administration at Washington, D. C. He has not yet received travel orders, but has been advised to be prepared to leave for Washington about June 1. No appointment to fill the vacancy at the local facility has not yet been announced.

Warning Given On Land Purchase In Irrigation Plan

Lands in the Columbia Basin irrigation project are being sold under misrepresentations by agents of some land companies, according to a warning received today by the Roseburg chamber of commerce from the Spokane chamber of commerce. The warning, according to the letter from Spokane, has been authorized by the U. S. bureau of reclamation. For self protection, the warning states, anyone who considers the purchase of land which is to be irrigated in the project should obtain information from the bureau of reclamation, Coulee Dam, Wash., before entering into any contract.

It is stated that it will be 25 years before water is available for some of the lands of the project. All tracts have been classified and appraised, and the classification and appraisal of any tract will be provided free upon request. Some persons who have bought land from agents have paid four times the appraisal value and one purchaser bought land to which water will not be delivered before 1955, the warning states.

The American Bible society reports that from Jan. 1, 1940, to March 1, 1941, it has supplied by gift to army chaplains 986 Bibles, 49,314 New Testaments and 48,812 Gospels and other portions. This does not include 291 Bibles, 45,812 Gospels and other portions supplied in the same period to chaplains in the service of the CCC personnel. The rate of issue to the army chaplain is rapidly increasing. The society will shortly send to every chaplain and to all new appointees as they are commissioned a pamphlet on, "The Army Chaplain and the Bible," based on material furnished by a score of experienced chaplains. The first binding of the society's special "Army Testament" of 70,000 copies is nearly exhausted, and a new binding of 93,000 is in process. The new binding will contain on the flyleaf a statement by President Roosevelt commending the scriptures to the men of the army. Friends of the soldiers have purchased more than 13,000 copies of the Army Testament for presentation to individual soldiers. Here is a great opportunity to present the word of God to young men leaving home and it is the "word" that shall not return unto God void, but will prosper where it is spread. Amen.
