## CCC Enrollment to Be Opened to Jobless Men

## France's Sub-Boat Fleet May War on Britain, Prospect

WASHINGTON, May 19.—(AP)—A huge fleet of submarines which once fought at Britain's side might be used against her in the life-or-death battle of the Atlantic if Germany obtains the collaboration of France to the extent of taking over or winning domination of the French Navy.

The submarines are the most numerous of all the vessels at the disposal of the Vichy government. Secretary Knox told Congress earlier this year that the French had 60 of the undersea craft, 52 destroyers, 14 cruisers, one aircraft carrier and one battleship.

Authoritative quarters here do not believe the Nazis ever would be able to gain control of all these vessels. The aircraft carrier referred to apparently is the Bearn, now stationed at the French Island of Martinique in the Caribbean, and the cruisers presumably include the light cruiser Emile Bertin, also at Martinique, and the Jeanne D'Arc at nearby Guadaloupe.

Naval experts take it for granted that neither the United States nor Great Britain would willingly permit these ships to quit their berths in the heart of the western hemisphere naval defense area.

Other units of the French fleet, believed to include destroyers and lesser craft, are known to have been stationed in French Indo-Chinese ports after collapse of the mother country last June. Some or all of these may still be there, and it is questionable whether they would join the axis forces.

Thus the submarines, virtually all of which are believed based on French Mediterranean and Atlantic ports, might furnish the Germans their most useful additional striking power.

## Hess Loses Confidence in Nazi Win, Disclosure

LONDON, May 19.—(AP)—A BBC broadcast to Germany said today that Rudolf Hess, the runaway Lieutenant-Fuehrer, had been "busy writing and talking" for a week and that Prime Minister Churchill had received a "full report of his many statements."

The announcer said: "A clue to the reason why Hess has lost his confidence in the possibility of a German victory may be found in a recent number of the Zeitschrift Fur Geopolitik, the organ of his friend, Major-General Professor Doctor Haushofer, whose arrest has been reported and denied in Berlin. "Haushofer was frank enough to express considerable pessimism about Germany's prospects in view of the United States intervention in the war."
