TOMORROW, and for several
days thereafter, the olive
drab uniforms of the army will
be a usual sight in our city. Trim
army vehicles of various types
large and small will be seen.
The officers and men of the
Third Division will stop over
night.

It is a pleasure for us to have
these young army men with us.
Just what does happen to Joe,
and Bill and George when they
leave home and go to the army?
We shall have a chance to see
how they look and how they
act, now that they are soldiers,
and all in all, how the army life
seems to be agreeing with them.
As it happens the Joes, Bills and

will not be in this division. But

pare. We must have a large
army—possibly the largest army.

it out of existence so that ordi-
nary people can go about their
daily business free and at peace.
If we do have to take part in
such an endeavor, our army will
be trained, equipped and ready.
If action is never necessary, the
training these men receive will
do them good.

on the part of what remains

of France. It has long been ap-
parent that French morale is in
a state of decay.

OUT OUR WAY

WHILE you have your map
out, take a look at Syria.
You will note that without Tur-
kish permission German military
forces can be got into Syria only
by water through the eastern
Mediterranean or by air trans-
port. The British navy at Alex-
andria, at Crete and at Cyprus
ought to be able to blast German
water communications and it is
improbable that sufficient forces
for successful attack on either
Iraq or Suez could be ferried in
by air.

Then take a look at Turkey.
You will find an important rail
line leading down from Istanbul
to the very places Germany
wants to go.

FOR months Franz von Papen,

Germany's diplomatic trouble-
shooter in the Balkans, has been
hanging around Ankara (Turkish
capital), vibrating back and
forth between there and Ber-
lin.

Every time the pinch comes,
Russia knuckles under to Ger-
many. Turkey's fate, by her own
frequent admission, lies in Rus-
sia's hands. A flat order from
Stalin would be pretty sure to
result in Turkish permission for
the passage of German armies.

So keep your eyes on Turkey
in these days when big events are
in the making.

AS for Hess, the real inside

story of his weird adventure
will probably not be told until
the historians are permitted to
dig into the secret files of the
governments concerned after the
war.

The present British propaga-
nda line is that he was escap-
ing from Germany to the country
offering safest sanctuary and that
his escape must embarrass the
nazis tremendously. The Ger-
man line is that he blew his top
and went off on his own on a
crazy one-man peace mission.

If you are wise, you will keep
your fingers strictly crossed as to
both stories and will do no
wishful thinking.

Brooklyn Lineup

Given Big Shakeup,
But Cubs Win Out

In Chicago yesterday Durocher
stuck Pete Reiser back into the
Brooklyn lineup, in place of Jim-
my Wastell, who'd been leading
the club with a .370 average;
benched Dixie Walker in favor
of right-handed hitting Joe Vos-
mik, and—the Dodgers blew a
7-4 decision to the Cubs. With
the St. Louis Cardinals mean-
while shading the Phillies, 6-5,
that left Brooklyn only a game
in front of the Redbirds.

Even Durocher's pet pitching
magic, fast-baller Wyatt, lost its
effect for once.

But this time, though Ducky
Medwick ran his hitting streak
to 17 straight and Cub errors
made all of the Dodger runs
glimmer, Chicago got the jump
in the first inning and never was
headed. Wyatt finally was knock-
ed out in the seventh, while Lar-
ry French survived his mates'
fielding lapses to take a nine-
hitter.

But it was Mize's single with
the bases loaded in the ninth that
scored the deciding run for the
Cardinals and the Cards had to
pay a goodly price for the tri-
umph though, for catcher Walker
Cooper was shelved for probably
six weeks when he dislocated his
shoulder in a collision at the plate.

Back in third place the New
York Giants ran their winning
streak to four straight by beating
the Pittsburgh Pirates, 5-4.

Red's Loosing Streak Halted

Meanwhile Derringer, getting
his third win of the year, halted
the Cincinnati Reds out of their
longest losing streak in more than
300 games. Two handy singles
by Rockies Chuck Aleno dovetail-
ed with Derringer's seventh-in-
ning one-strikeout pitching for a 4-3
defeat of the Boston Braves after
six losses.

Most of the day's hitting, and
all of the day's homers, occurred
in the American League. The
lowly Philadelphia Athletics set
the keynote by clubbing Rookie
Foggett and two Cleveland relief
pitchers for 16 hits and a 10-3
victory that ended the Tribe's
victory string at five straight.

The second place Chicago White
Sox and the New York Yankees
got 16 safeties apiece, the Sox
outslugging the Washington Sena-
tors 10-5. All of the Yankees hit safe-
ties, Joe Gordon doubling a three-
run homer to back up Gomez'
six-hit pitching for a 12-2 thump-
ing of the St. Louis Browns.

The Detroit Tigers, who seem
to be recovering from Green-
berg's departure, won their fourth
in a row, though they had to go
14 innings to do it. Two unearned
runs were the margin of a 6-5
triumph over the Boston Red
Sox.
