Alien Gun Licenses in Oregon Must Be Renewed
All alien gun licenses issued prior to December 31, 1940, must be renewed, according to an announcement made by Frank B. Wire, state game supervisor. Heretofore this type of license was considered to have no expiration date, but under a ruling of the attorney general the alien gun licenses come under the general law requiring renewal of all licenses at the end of each calendar year. The alien gun license fee is \$25 and is in addition to the regular hunting or trapping license.
Don't Molest Fawns, Commission's Advice
At this time of the year, when does are dropping their fawns, the state game commission officials and state police are flooded with inquiries concerning deserted fawns. If you're tramping through a deer country and run into a fawn, seemingly deserted, don't molest it, because in all probability its mother is out foraging for food and will be back in due time to give maternal attention to the young one. The best rule, say game officials, is to just keep hand off the fawns and let the mother handle the situation.

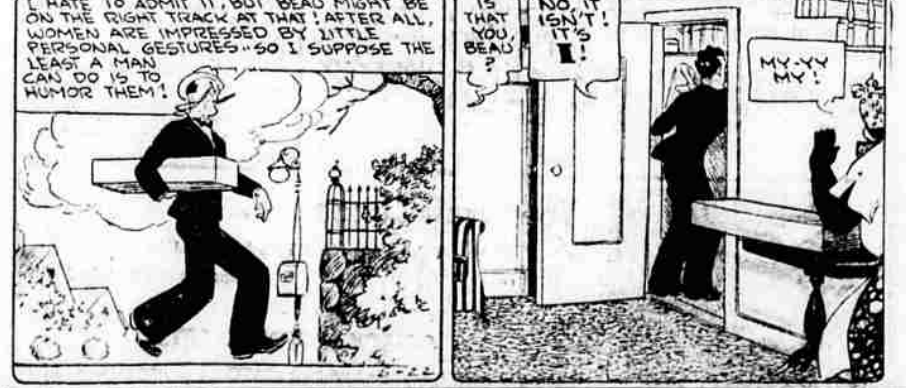
