

Jansen Wins His 6th Game; Padres Victims, 18 to 5

Larry Jansen, San Francisco's prize rookie from Forest Grove, Ore., by way of Salt Lake City, was the Pacific Coast league's leading pitcher until he tried to serve to Sacramento last Sunday. Sacramento battered the fastballer from the box in an 11-run first inning and went on to hand the Seals their worst drubbing of the year, 21-6.

Last night it was Jansen's turn again, with San Diego the opposition, and his still fuming fellow Seals gained their mate and themselves a vicarious revenge by whacking the Padres, 18-5, on 21 hits.

Jansen tossed an eight-hitter and was untouchable in all but three innings, achieving his sixth win of the season against the single loss at Sacramento.

The victory, second in two nights, advanced San Francisco within a half-game of third-place San Diego.

Otherwise, however, the Seals made no headway against the leaders. No. 1 Sacramento topped Los Angeles again, 10-2, and runnerup Seattle nudged Oakland, 4-3.

Hollywood edged a quartet of Portland pitchers for 17 hits and took its second in a row from the eighth-place Beavers, 10-5.

"Baer will be as tough as anyone I've fought, but I expect to knock him out in less than 10 rounds," Louis said.

"Buddy is big, and can punch, so it ought to be a good battle."

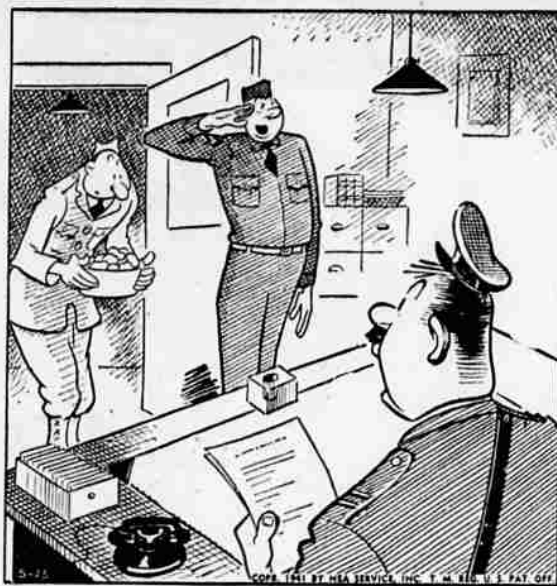
From Buddy: "I'm in better condition than ever before. I think I can get to Louis with my right, and if I do I'll be the next champion."

Cardinals Down Dodgers; Feller Wins Duel, 4 to 0

The St. Louis Cardinals clubbed the Brooklyn Dodgers their fifth straight defeat yesterday 9-3 with a vicious 13-hit assault. While the Cardinals were thus emphasizing their intention of controlling the senior circuit, Feller pitched the Cleveland Indians back to victory and security in the American League.

He tangled with southpaw Chase of the Washington Senators in a sensational pitching duel that went scoreless for ten innings before the Indians ex-

ploded four runs in the 11th to win 4-0. Feller allowed only four hits in scoring his eighth victory and first shutout of the season.

The five-game winning streak of the second place Chicago White Sox was snapped by the Philadelphia Athletics, whose 7-6 victory was their fourth in a row.

The New York Yankees knocked the Detroit Tigers out of third place with a ten-inning 5-4 victory achieved on a two-run rally that tied the score in the ninth and Rolfe's triple scoring the winning run in the tenth.

The St. Louis Browns banged out four home runs in the first five innings but were beaten 8-6 by the Boston Red Sox, who bunched their hits for five runs in the seventh and eighth innings.

The New York Giants solved the pitching magic of Walters

and cuffed the Cincinnati Reds 6-3 in ten innings.

The Pittsburgh Pirates spotted the Boston Braves a four-run lead in the first inning and then battled back to an 8-4 decision. The Cubs pounced on the Phillies 7-3 with a grand-slam homer by Nicholson in the fifth and a combination four-hit pitching job by Erickson and Mooney.
