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The Boys Enjoy Stopping Here

HAVING the soldiers of the Third Division with us this week has been both an interesting and a pleasant experience. We have learned a great deal about the army of 1941 and its equipment—and the men have learned a considerable amount about the hospitality and general good spirit of this community. The writer of these lines has had the good fortune to talk with a number of the enlisted men and some of the officers—without exception they have praised the treatment received here and the entertainment provided.

As one of the boys said last evening, "It's the people that make the difference. The people of this town are mighty fine folks and that makes this a mighty good town."

Curious as to just why he made the statement in just the way he did, and with such evident feeling, we asked what he meant.

"Well," he said, "the folks here treat us and talk to us just as if we are people like they are. So many places they seem to think that because we are wearing a uniform we are ruffians or something. They sort of look at us with queer cold stares, and avoid having anything to do with us. The people here are not like that, they are human—and it sure makes us fellows feel good."

Yes, and it makes us feel good to know that the soldiers were received in that way. The young man was most definitely right—it's the people that make the difference.

And from our point of view we can hand it right back, so to speak. These young soldiers, officers and men, have conducted themselves as gentlemen. There have been no disorders. The city police force has had very little work to do. It is safe to say that a composite opinion is expressed in stating that Roseburg citizens have enjoyed having the troops stop here.

Upon All of Us

FROM the Soldier's Handbook, a small pocket introduction to military life issued by the war department:

"The American people of their own will, and through the men they have elected to represent them in congress, have determined that the free institutions of this country will continue to exist. They have declared that, if necessary, we will defend our right to live in our own American way and continue to enjoy the benefits and privileges which are granted to the citizens of no other nation. It is upon you, and the many thousands of your comrades now in the military service, that our country has placed its confident faith that this defense will succeed should it ever be challenged."

Yes. And it is also upon you, there at the lathe, you swinging the hammer in the shipyard, you on the assembly line, you at the desk, that our country has also placed its faith and its future. Every American, soldier and civilian, bears his share of the responsibility for defending freedom which the times have imposed upon us.

CHURCHILL reports today: "In one operation, the Germans dropped 3,000 parachutists

Two hours after the attack began, the greater part of these had been accounted for."

By "accounted for," he means killed, wounded or taken prisoner.

IN Cairo "informed Greek sources" say they understand the British have the Crete situation well in hand, but acknowledge that some invading units are still fighting.

Don't jump to conclusions. This will be a CONTINUING battle, not given up after any minor preliminary reverses. It is a fair guess the Germans are putting their carefully developed methods of air attack to a definite test for which they must have made complete preparation.

The battle of Crete won't be over in a day.

ONE or two German SEABORNE transports (meaning troopships) are said in London today to have penetrated the British defenses of Crete.

These are apt to be the troop-carrying ships the Germans are said to have passed through the Bosphorus (and presumably the Dardanelles) within the past few days or weeks.

NO change is reported today from Tobruk.

Here is something to watch: If the Germans attacking Tobruk begin to show suddenly increased strength, it will be a sign they have successfully taken advantage of concentration of the British fleet for the defense of Crete to rush reinforcements across the narrow straits of Sicily—perhaps landing them at French Tunis.
