Forest Fire Fighting Again Will Be Taught

CORVALLIS, May 26.—(AP)—The "red hats," young fellows learning the science of forest fire fighting by both theory and practice—will be trained again this year under an expanded program supervised by the school of forestry at Oregon State college.

George H. Schroeder, assistant professor of forestry, will supervise the program which will be conducted at one main and three branch camps instead of only

one central camp as was done last year.

The home camp this year will be located six miles northwest of Corvallis and will handle 125 men. Branch camp locations have not been picked definitely.

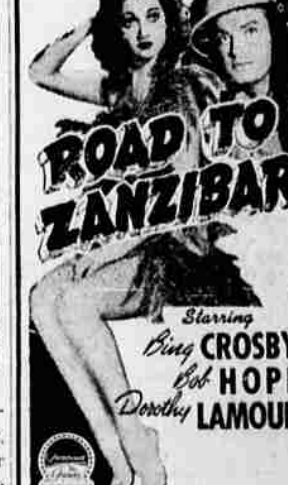
Circuit Judge Winberly reported that a number of cases are expected to be ready for hearing at a later date and the jury probably will be called back during the month of June.
