Umpqua Academy Association to Hold Annual Session Sunday, June 1

The Umpqua Academy Association will hold its annual session at Wilbur Sunday, June 1. The following program has been planned to open at ten-thirty in the morning with services in charge of Dr. Charles A. Edwards. A basket lunch will be held at noon and the business meeting will open at two o'clock, followed by a song service and an address by Dr. Sills Fairham, D. D., president of the Oregon Federation of Churches; flag drill and skit by the pupils of the Wilbur school; music and benediction.

This historical society has been meeting annually for the last fifteen years in commemoration of the hardy pioneer fathers and mothers who overcame all obstacles to establish homes, schools and churches in the state of Oregon and the success they made in developing the very highest type of citizenship among the younger generations of pioneer children is well worth the study of modern instructors and psychologists.

In the different sections of the United States some special factor has led to its development; California had its missions; Massachusetts, religious liberty; Georgia, fame for debtors and so on. To Oregon was left largely the factor of the great influence in the home, school and church of the Methodist Episcopal "circuit rider."

This was true in the establishment of the Umpqua Academy in about 1852 or 1853. Several families had settled in or near Wilbur in 1849 to 1853. Among them were the Buntons, Reeds, Clinkensbeards, Hill, Dillons, Casebeers, Aikins, Oteys, Grubbes, Chapman and Holman families. In 1849 the Oregon and California mission conference of the Methodist Episcopal church was organized at Salem and through this organization James H. Wilbur, D. D., was appointed to cover this section of Oregon to develop churches and schools and began his duties at once.

He soon moved his family to what was then known as Buntan's gap, later the name was changed in honor of "Father" Wilbur to its present name of Wilbur.

The Methodist church had already established the Willamette university at Salem and soon Father Wilbur, with the aid of

the "settlers" set about to organize the Umpqua academy as a "feeder" for the university. They first had a small school that was maintained in a crudely built "lean-to" around a tree, but by 1855 was a well established school and in 1857 was chartered by the territorial government of Oregon. The first board of trustees named by this charter are as follows: Rev. James H. Wilbur; Hon. Matthew P. Deady, Addison R. Flint, Fleming R. Hill, James O. Raynor, Benjamin J. Grubbe, John Kuykendall, Willis Jenkins and William Royal.

Many of the first teachers were ordained Methodist ministers, among whom were Rev. J. H. B. Royal, Rev. T. F. Royal, Rev. Clark Smith, Rev. Isaac Dillon and Rev. J. H. Skidmore. Among the later instructors were Edward D. Curtis, F. H. Grubbe, Willis C. Hawley, Henry L. Benson and Frank Benson. In this short article it is impossible to name the wonderful list of lady assistant teachers or the long list of students, many of whom later occupied high positions in the state, county and nation and many ranked high in all professional lines.

A very strong influence in the moral and religious life of the school were the Methodist ministers and their families. These men were "circuit riders" and often preached in several places every Sunday and held "protracted meetings" through the week in different communities. They also held several "camp" meetings during the year. These were wonderful occasions to the early day settlers as they meant a two weeks rest to the housewife and a quiet prayerful time to readjust life's nervous problems. Outstanding among these men are Rev. Wilbur, Rev. Royal, Rev. Robert Booth, Rev. T. L. Jones, Rev. Miller, "Father" Kinney and Rev. I. D. Driver and many others. The old Umpqua Academy had seemingly finished its educational purpose by 1889 and was transferred to the county school system, when it became a part of the regular public schools.

All former students of the academy and friends are cordially invited to enjoy the annual affair Sunday, June 1.
