U. S. Cutter Rescues 39 From Torpedoed Vessel

WASHINGTON, May 27.—(AP)—The coast guard and navy reported today that 39 survivors of the British steamer Marconi had been rescued by the coast guard cutter General Greene, about 270 miles southeast of Greenland.

The navy reported that about 40 more crew members—the coast guard said 60—of the Marconi were believed drifting in two lifeboats in heavy fog in the same vicinity. The cutter was searching for them.

The navy's information did not state the manner of the Marconi's sinking, but the coast guard radio report declared she was torpedoed yesterday.
