Memorial Day

It is a beautiful custom that a liberty loving people of a redeemed nation should pause a moment once each year, from the busy forum of life's endeavors to revere the memory of departed loved ones and to pay full measure of devotion and respect to the nation's heroic dead.

Memorial day is strictly of American origin. It had its inception in the south and its history reads as one of the finest tributes ever paid to womanhood. There in the warm clime where nature is always at her best in the production of luxuriant vegetation; grass soon grew over the graves where our soldiers were buried. Wild flowers, watered by the dew of heaven and kissed by the warm sunshine grew in abundance and it seemed that they were the most beautiful and fragrant in all the world. These flowers grew over the mounds that marked the last resting places of the heroes, making no distinction whether the one who slept beneath had worn a blue or a gray uniform.

From this setting a noble band of ladies gained inspiration to laurel the graves of their dead. Their first thought was of their own, and there was a temptation to let the graves of the foes go unattended; but when the better angel of their nature was touched by the selfishness of the wild flowers, they set out to their task with kind and loving hands and sympathetic hearts gathered from the hills and valleys the choicest garlands of flowers and wove them into beautiful wreaths and sprays and gently with tenderness placed them upon the graves of both friend and foe.

This unselfish devotion to our country's heroes by these kindly ladies of the Southland has been immortalized by Francis Finch in poem, depicting the spirit of forgiveness and the blessings of a reunited country. One stanza reads as follows:

Or the winding river be cry sever,
Or the winding river be cry sever,
They banish our anger forever,
When they laurel the graves of our dead

Under the sod and the dew
Waiting the judgment day,
Love and tears for the blue
Tears and love for the gray.

THAT would involve sending expeditionary forces to foreign soil.

IN the light of these grave and possibly fateful definitions of national policy, we must ALL agree with the president's statement that "NO DISPUTES OF ANY SORT must interfere with arms production."

We can't fight without weapons.

AS a dramatic climax to the president's speech, he proclaims a state of "unlimited emergency."

What does that mean?

In practice, not much.

A state of unlimited emergency presumably confers upon the president all the powers he would normally be entitled to wield in time of actual war.

In reality, he possesses practically unlimited power already, through delegation by congress.

It does, however, call attention to the gravity of the present situation. That is probably its purpose.

Choral Club Of Eugene Will Offer Fine Concert Here

The Eugene Women's Choral club, which is to be presented in concert at the Roseburg high school auditorium Monday, June 2, at 8 p. m., is a civic organization paralleling its more famous brother group, the Eugene Gleemen. The object of both these bodies is to foster good will by volunteering their talents in benefit concerts in various towns and cities of the state.

Although the Gleemen have previously appeared in Roseburg the concert here Monday will be a "first" for the women.

Organized six years ago under the leadership of John Stark Evans, director of the Gleemen, the ladies have been for the past four years under the direction of Cora Moore Frey, the accompanist for the men's group.

The program here will be wide varied including modern songs, folk tunes, sacred numbers, nonsense tunes and a group of Victor Herbert's best loved melodies.

Two of the chorus members, Margaret Strassmaier, contralto, and Lillian Brynder, soprano, are to sing incidental solos with chorus accompaniment. Also on the program will be "The Arkansas Traveler," a novelty number with piano duet by Margaret Hillier and Dorothy Davis Lee, the latter the club accompanist.

The concert is sponsored by the Roseburg Men's Glee club and all proceeds will go to the swimming pool fund.

Umpqua Academy Reunion Will Be Held Next Sunday

The 25th annual reunion of the Umpqua Academy association at Wilbur Sunday, June 1, is expected to draw a large attendance from all parts of Oregon. The association is composed of the former students of the pioneer academy, established in 1853, and by the alumni of the Wilbur high school which followed the school originally founded as a Methodist institution of higher learning.

The reunion program Sunday will open at 10:30 a. m. with the invocation by D. P. McKay, and a religious service conducted by the Rev. C. A. Edwards of Roseburg.

A basket lunch will be enjoyed during the noon hour.

Douglas county residents are requested by the committee in charge of the lunch to be prepared with lunches sufficient for two or three visiting friends. Coffee and cream will be furnished at the picnic grounds by the committee.

The annual business meeting of the association will be held at 2 p. m. and will be followed by a public program including group singing, an address of welcome by Mrs. Inez Miller, solos by Mrs. Pearl and daughter, flag drill by the pupils of Wilbur school, a vocal solo, skit and benediction. The principal feature of the program will be an address by the Rev. Silas Fairham, D. D., Portland, president of the Oregon Council of Churches. The Rev. Mr. Fairham will speak on the subject, "Imperishable Ideals."

Memorial Address Given At Rotary by Dr. Roach

Stressing the necessity of preservation of democracy by making our nation strong within

itself, Rev. M. H. Roach, pastor of the Roseburg Presbyterian church, gave a Memorial day observance address before the Roseburg Rotary club yesterday. He discussed the subject, "Democracy and Christianity."

Chas. Emery, program committee chairman, announced that Wayne L. Morse, noted labor authority and dean of the University of Oregon law school, will be the speaker at the inter-city meeting of Rotary clubs to be held here Saturday evening, June 7.

Drivers License Service Announced

Applications for renewal of automobile drivers licenses will be accepted daily after June 1, it was announced today by R. R. Brand, who has been named as a special clerk by the state motor vehicle department. Mr. Brand will be in the office in the courthouse at Roseburg Saturday of this week, and will continue in the office each week day throughout the month of June.

All drivers licenses expire June 30 and must be renewed prior to that date. Examinations are required only of persons 70 or more years of age, new drivers, or those who have suffered physical disability. Such examinations are conducted only on Tuesdays of each week by the travelling examiner. For those, however, for whom examinations are not required, renewal applications will be accepted by Mr. Brand upon payment of the fee of \$1.50.

Nazi Planes Able To Attack U. S., Briton Declares

LONDON, May 30.—(AP)—An article in the authoritative aviation publication, "Aeroplane," published today, states that "whenever the Germans want to bomb New York they can do it."

The detailed article, by Peter Masefield, said the Germans, using four types of long-range bombers, could attack the eastern seaboard and Panama from bases in Norway, France, Portugal and West Africa.

"The author apparently takes it for granted that the Germans would acquire bases in Portugal and West Africa for such an undertaking. Those areas are not now German-occupied."

"If they (the Germans) decide to bomb airplane factories on Long Island, in Baltimore or Hartford, they have bombers capable of performing the task and getting back to Europe again," the writer asserts.

"The canal zone is not outside the range of certain of their airplanes. Given new bases in Europe more favorably placed in relation to the United States, the bombs carried in each airplane might rise to 15,000 pounds."

WASHINGTON, May 30.—(AP)—A combined army-navy airforce of 56,000 warplanes, informed legislators disclosed today, will be provided by the funds which President Roosevelt has asked of congress. The full strength is expected to be reached by the fall of 1943.
