

Feller Shuts Out Detroit; Dietrich Hurls One-Hitter

(By the Associated Press.)
Bob Feller yesterday pitched one of his magnificent games, scattering seven Detroit hits, striking out eight and allowing only two runners to get past first base. The score was 9-0.

It was Feller's tenth victory against two defeats this season. While Cleveland was regaining its grip on the American league, the St. Louis Cardinals rolled their winning string to ten games for the second time this season with a 10-9 decision over the Cincinnati Reds in the National.

Dietrich Hurls One-Hitter.

The most spectacular individual performance of yesterday was the one-hit pitching show put on by respected Bill Dietrich of the Chicago White Sox in shutting out the St. Louis Browns, 4-0. Dietrich, who pitched a no-hit game against the Browns in 1937, also had a two-hitter against Detroit earlier this season.

The only safety off him this time was a single by Laabs in the fourth.

The ten-game losing streak of the Washington Senators was charitably checked by rain which washed out a five-run sixth inning of the New York Yankees and left the score tied at 2-2.

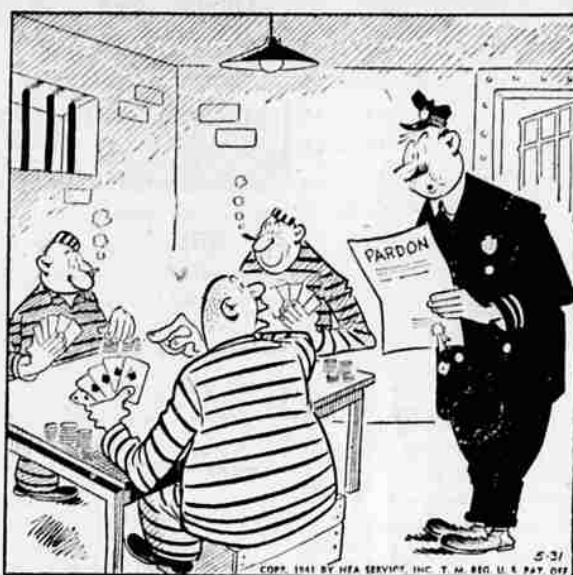
The Boston Red Sox benched Jimmy Fox at his own request and punched out a 6-4 verdict over the Philadelphia Athletics.

The judge ruled this treaty was superseded by the selective service act.

The 71 tribesmen brought their action despite the announced disapproval of the Yakima tribal council.

The crumbling Sacramento Senators, pilloried and plastered in unprecedented manner, today lead the Pacific coast league chase by only nine full games.

These once invincible baseballers lost to San Francisco again last night, 9-2. It was their second defeat in a row and now they actually trail in the current series, two games to one.

Only once before this season have the Senators been beaten twice in succession, and never before by the same team.

At Portland Pitcher Ad Liska and his fellow Beavers finally got operations under way after two nights of rain and stopped Oakland, 7-2, to take over sixth place from the visiting Oaks.

Out-hit, 8-7, Seattle bunched three of its blows for one run in the seventh and profited from two errors for another pair in the eighth to beat out Hollywood, 3-1, and square the series in the Washington city at a game apiece.

First Baseman McDonald poked a two-run first-inning homer and San Diego kept ahead from there on to halt Los Angeles, 6-4. Undefeated Rookie Tex Dillbeck, holding the Angels hitless until the fourth inning, gained his third victory, and the Padres took a 2-1 lead for the week's play.

were for the benefit of every people of every nation. The onward march of aggression was stopped, but the seeds of conquest, hatred and domination were not eradicated, but have sprung up again in a more hideous form than ever before. So on this Memorial day we find our nation facing its greatest peril since the days of its founding and the question again arises as to whether a people with the ideals and the principals such as ours, and based upon that foundation, known as the Constitution, can live in the world today.

"The thoughts on this Memorial day should cause each of us to earnestly consider the meaning and the purpose for which all the past sacrifices have been given, and ask ourselves the question, are we of today, into whose hands has been placed the torch of liberty, to idly or carelessly let it be snatched from us and its light forever be extinguished? By the sacrifices of those living and dead, the light of liberty has so far been maintained in our own country. So it was with some nations and countries across the water, but today these nations, nearly all but China and Great Britain, have fallen before the mailed fist and under the iron heel of a tyrant, whose whole ambition is, not only to rule a continent but the entire world. Wherever that blight has settled, freedom has vanished, the right of free speech and free press has gone, and the peoples can no longer even worship as they choose.

"All those small nations of Europe have been trampled under foot. That once proud and powerful nation of France, who in days gone by sent to us their Lafayette, is at this very moment forced to her knees and paying tribute to the mailed fist of the Nazi war lords. The only things that today keep that same mailed fist from reaching out to pull down our Stars and Stripes is the soldiers and the navy of Great Britain, the last great liberty loving nation of the world, except our own. If Great Britain should fall, then we alone, the last world power and democracy, must face the dictator-controlled world.

Defense Need at Hand

"I wonder if this great country we are privileged to call our own with our American ideals, our freedom to worship according to the dictates of our own conscience, our American homes, our many sacred institutions, and our flag itself, mean anything to us. If they do, are they not worth defending? I maintain they are, and now is the time to make that defense, and in what way is necessary, and not wait until the aerial bomb, the torpedo and the screaming shell descend upon the cities, towns and the countryside of our fair land and by their destruction put us to work digging among the flaming ruins to secure the bodies of friend and relative and bear them off to yonder cemetery.

"To the people of the small nations of Europe, and to France and Great Britain our thoughts go out today in deepest sympathy. But this war was started on that side of the water, and I maintain that we should confine it to the place where it is, and not let it spread, and we should help put an end to it and to the efforts of those responsible for it, over there.

War Preferred to Slavery

"No one wants war, but war is preferable to slavery any day, and if we of the United States are not willing to defend what we believe to be right and proper, even if we have to fight to do it, then I believe that such persons are no longer worthy to live under the protecting folds of our nation's flag. If such should be the case, then we have already, to that extent, broken faith with those who gave their lives that this nation might live.

"I listened to an address over the radio a few days ago, by one whose opinion, as I gathered, was that the United States should crawl into a shell and stay there, and keep out of the present troubles; that if the United States should become involved in the war, we would lose all of our American ideals and the Nazi influence would dominate this nation, so we must remain out and thus save our ideals for the world. In my opinion such words would be wonderful, if they were not so serious under present conditions. My friends, let me ask you this: If

"For years these influences from the dictator nations have been boring into the very foundations of this nation, and the example of all the little nations of Europe today, and of powerful France, should teach us of the United States that we cannot toy or compromise with such influence and save our nation.

"I have faith in my country, I have faith in the citizen who lives beneath the Stars and Stripes, although there are many black sheep here and I have faith that we, as a nation, will use our might and power, to stop the hand of the aggressor and help plant again that Christian faith among the nations of the world."
