

Cardinals Split 2 With Reds; Dodgers Down N. Y. Twice

Memorial day proved that the St. Louis Cardinals can be beaten, even though this point was proved only with difficulty.

The Cardinals captured their first game, 4-1, to extend their winning streak to 11, but they finally were nosed out by the Cincinnati Reds, 3-2, in a 13-inning nightcap.

The second-place Brooklyn Dodgers, who previously had winning streaks of nine and seven games, ran another string to seven by crushing the New York Giants, 8-0 and 6-2.

Wyatt pitched five-hit ball for his eighth victory and third shut-out in the opener and the Dodgers exploded a five-run rally in the ninth inning to bag the second game.

The Boston Braves and Philadelphia Phillies broke their losing strings at the expense of each other. After losing six straight, the Phils took the first game, 6-5, and increased Boston's chain of losses to eight. The Braves put a stop to this by taking the second game, 4-1, with Lefty Art Johnson pitching five-hit ball and fanning eight in his first major league start.

The Chicago Cubs and Pittsburgh Pirates also divided in their party. Triples by Cavaretta and Sturgeon, each with two on, helped the Cubs win the first game, 7-6. Then Rip Sewell, who had been belted out of the box in the opener, came back in relief to win the nightcap, 5-4.

Cleveland Twice Beaten. White Sox cut down the American League leading Cleveland Indians twice, 7-1 and 5-2, to reduce the margin between them to two games.

The Philadelphia Athletics walloped the Washington Senators twice, 7-4 and 14-4, to extend the Senators' losing streak to a dozen games and sink them deeper in the cellar.

The Detroit Tigers swept two from the St. Louis Browns, 6-5 and 10-6, with a free-hitting attack topped by Rudy York's 11th and 12th homers for the year, one in each game.

Two young pitchers, turned in fine jobs in Boston, but the Red Sox came out with nothing better than an even break against the New York Yankees.

The Yanks won, 4-3, in the first game.

In the second game Harris shut out the Bronx bombers, 13-0.

Rose, Davis Split Auto Race Victory

INDIANAPOLIS, May 31.—(AP)—There was some question today as to how formal credit would be distributed for the two-man victory of Mauri Rose and Floyd Davis in the 29th annual 500-mile Memorial day automobile race. A formal judges' decision was expected late today.

Rose, a trouble-shooter in an Indianapolis airplane motor plant, drove the winning car the last 322.1 miles after Davis, a Springfield, Ill., contractor, had qualified and started the car. The winning machine averaged 115.17 miles an hour, the second fastest time in the race's history.

Rose's original car, with which he captured the pole position, was forced out by carburetor trouble at 152 miles. Then he shifted to the four-cylinder speedster driven by Davis.

Rex Mays, Glendale, Calif., repeated as runner-up with an average of 114.813 and Ted Horn, Paterson, N. J., was third with a speed of 113.864.

The approximately \$100,000 of prize money was to be distributed among the first ten finishers late today.

Seals Hold Sacramento Even in Ball Series

After losing a 3-1 opener to the Sacramento Senators in last night's double-header, the San Francisco Seals fought the Senators for eight innings to a 3-3 tie in the nightcap, called at five minutes to midnight under league rules.

The net result for the Senators was to even up their current series with the Seals at two games apiece, and one tied. This is not very satisfying for the Senators, who have been breezing through opposition, and are leading the Pacific Coast league with a percentage of .731.

In other Memorial day double-headers, Hollywood and Seattle split, Seattle winning the opener 14-3, and Hollywood taking the second, 6-0; and San Diego beat Los Angeles, 5-3, in the opener and dropped the second to Los Angeles, 6-4.

At Portland, rain halted the program at the end of the seventh inning of the first game of a scheduled double bill with Oakland. Portland won, 4-1, behind Hilleher's hurling.

BAKERS STILL OUT: PAY HOIST GIVEN BY GROCERS

PORTLAND, May 31.—(AP)—A bakery workers' strike entered its seventh day with settlement not in sight today, but the AFL grocery clerk, representing 1000 workers, signed a contract which calls for higher pay and shorter hours.

AFL cannery workers received a 27 per cent pay increase in contracts signed here yesterday by the Libby, McNeil & Libby and the Star Products companies.

Men's pay advanced from 45 to 57 cents an hour, women's from 35 to 45 cents. A week's paid vacation was included for the 1600 employees.

Drunken Driving Charge Follows Traffic Crash

A charge of drunken driving was lodged in justice court here today against Walter R. Bernal of Roseburg, following an automobile accident near Yoncalla Friday. Mrs. Bernal was treated at Mercy hospital for back injuries, which were not believed to be of a serious nature.

State Police Sergeant Paul Morgan reported that a light truck driven by Bernal crashed into a parked automobile, while the parked car was being checked by a state police patrolman.

C. E. Mabley, said by Morgan to have been riding with Bernal, was charged with being drunk on a highway.

Both men were given until Tuesday to enter their pleas in the justice court. Bernal furnished bail in the sum of \$250. Mabley was released on his own recognizance.

Copper Is Placed Under Government Control

WASHINGTON, May 31.—(AP)—The office of production management today placed copper under a system of mandatory, industry-wide control.

E. R. Stettinius, defense director of priorities, said the action was made necessary by "shortage of copper which is expected to become worse during 1941."

Priority, or preference, ratings will be issued for copper needed in defense industries. The remainder of the available supply will be allocated for civilian purposes.

Clothing Ration Placed In Effect in England

LONDON, May 31.—(AP)—The board of trade tonight announced rationing of almost all clothing, starting immediately. The plan authorizes 66 coupons

yearly for everyone and, as with wartime food dispensations, no traffic in coupons will be countenanced.

Clothing rationing was introduced in Germany at the start of the war, and Germans have bought on a "point system," by which every article of clothing takes a certain number of points from yearly quota allowed each person. Rationing of clothes was introduced for the first time in France early this spring and has been in effect in Switzerland for some time.

Roseburg Group to Hear Talk on Defense Work

A delegation from the Roseburg chamber of commerce will go to Medford Monday to attend a meeting to be addressed by an architect-engineer, engaged in national defense construction work. The speaker is expected to outline some of the national defense projects expected to be undertaken in southern Oregon, including the proposed army cantonment near Medford.

Yoncalla Eagles Down Indians In Ragged 14-6 Game

The big bats of the Yoncalla Eagles, County B league baseball champions, pounded out a 14-to-6 victory over the Roseburg Indians in a Memorial day baseball game at Finlay field Friday. The Indians were given their first defeat of the year.

The Roseburg players appeared nervous at the start of the game as Yoncalla pushed over two runs in the first inning on one hit, two errors, two stolen bases and a hit batter. However, singles by Wimberly and Baker, a walk to DeBernardi and two outfield flies gave the Indians a 3-to-2 lead in the first, the only time during the game Roseburg was out in front.

A second inning accident marred the game and was the turning point in the contest.

In the Yoncalla half of the second, with one out, Bigelow and Rice singled and Sharpo walked to fill the bases. Main singled to drive in two runs. Cox, who previously had struck out, drove a terrific smash straight back at DeBernardi, the Roseburg pitcher. DeBernardi partly broke the force of the blow with his glove, but the ball was hit so hard it broke through and struck him squarely between the eyes and knocked him unconscious, although he quickly recovered and suffered no serious effect.

Shaken by the blow, however, DeBernardi was wild and walked the next two batters as he tried to stay in the box. When he was unable to gain control, Baker was sent in to pitch for two innings, after which DeBernardi came back and finished the game.

Yoncalla pushed over five runs in the second inning to take a 7-to-3 lead, and added four more in the third inning.

The Indians drove Cox off the mound in the last of the third with two walks and a hard-hit right field drive for three bases by Earl Wiard. Norman Main took over the pitching duties for Yoncalla and his fast ball kept the Indians to three hits and one run for the remainder of the contest.

Britain Finally Wins In Struggle for Iraq

still in the fight were in between.

The high command said some of the British and Greeks had fled to the island of Gavdos, 25 miles off the south coast of Crete, where the Luftwaffe pursued them with bomb and machine-gun while also blasting at Crete's southern ports to smash the new Dunkerque.

The prevailing opinion of the German press and in military and political circles was that the occupation of Crete had brought into German hands "a key position between Europe, Asia Minor and Africa."

The Boersen Zeitung declared flatly that Crete will be "a jumping off base for an attack on Suez," and military spokesmen said that once Crete was established firmly as a German air and naval base "North Africa, Egypt and the Suez canal are in the danger zone."

Gen. Freyberg Not Killed

General B. C. Freyberg, commander of British imperial forces in Crete, is alive and with his troops, the London war office announced today.

The German radio reported yesterday that Freyberg was killed

in an air crash while flying from Crete to Egypt and accused him of deserting his command at a moment of peril.

Meantime it was disclosed British war casualties have reached the 100,000 mark for all three fighting services in 21 months of war.

Almost half the total were said to be prisoners of war in Germany.

The figures, computed from official casualty lists, show that the war so far has cost only a fraction of the 3,190,235 British men killed, wounded, missing or taken prisoner in the world war.

British military and naval casualties so far have numbered 101,056, of which 74,164 were from the army, 15,806 from the navy and 10,996 from the air force.

Unidentified planes roared over neutral Dublin, dropping three bombs which killed 52 persons and injured perhaps 200. One of the bombs blew out a glass skylight near the front door of the United States legation in Dublin.

of the French fleet or French territory in north and west Africa.

(President Roosevelt emphasized that viewpoint in his talk to the nation Tuesday when he specifically mentioned French African colonies and "the Atlantic fortress of Dakar" as possible springboards for German attacks on the western hemisphere.)

Senator Norris (Ind., Neb.), only living legislator who voted in the senate in 1917 against American entry into the world war, today suggested that the administration consider seriously the possibility of shifting the main body of the fleet from the Pacific to the Atlantic.

"We should decide which is our most dangerous enemy—Germany or Japan—and should use our fleet accordingly," the veteran legislator declared.

French Admiral Accuses Britain of "Piracy"

VICHY, Unoccupied France, May 31.—(AP)—Vice-Premier Darlan accused Britain today of "waging a war of piracy" against France.

His bitter statement was made after the French had reported a second British attack upon the French Tunisian port of Sfax, in north Africa. British planes, he said, bombed the harbor Friday, less than 24 hours after Vichy had formally protested a previous raid on Wednesday.

Referring specifically to the attacks upon Sfax, Darlan declared there were Italian ships in the ports of Spain, Portugal and South America and demanded to know why no bombs had been dropped, for instance, on Lisbon, and Valencia.

"In fact," he said, "there is only one objective of these acts of brutality, to eliminate French maritime power, cut continental France from its empire and isolate us from the rest of the world."

He declared 143 French ships had been captured by the British and charged that this was proof of Britain's practical means of replacing, at French expense, her dwindling merchant tonnage, even if it "leads the French population toward famine."

Land Batteries Reply

Three British planes bombed an Italian merchantman moored in the bay yesterday, the French said, adding that the attackers were met with fire from French land batteries and pursuit planes.

There was no announcement of damage on either side, but the French said the Italian vessel was not hit, although eight bombs fell around her as she lay moored about two miles from the town.

The dispatch telling of yesterday's attack said the British planes turned off immediately after the bombing, and it added, "French naval units and the air force are assuring the defense of Sfax." It made no specific mention of how this was being done.

In their protest on the Wednesday bombing, lodged with

the United States state department for transmission to Britain, the French said there was no justification in international law for the attack, since the two Italian merchantmen said to have been hit that day had been there less than the time permitted (72 hours.)

Hitler's Adviser, Friend Of Hess, Arrested by Nazis

NEW YORK, May 31.—(AP)—The arrest of Major-General Haushofer, the Munich professor who has been a close adviser of Adolf Hitler in the war, has been confirmed in reports reaching London, the British radio said.

In a broadcast heard here by CBS, the BBC said Haushofer's scheduled lecture May 24 at Strasbourg had been cancelled, and that in recent editions of a magazine he edited "he made veiled references to the dangers which are threatening Germany in the east."

"General Haushofer," the radio said, "who was introduced to Hitler in 1922 by Rudolf Hess, has been until very recently the closest adviser of the fuhrer in questions of geo-policy. Rudolf Hess, who is now prisoner of war in Great Britain, has shared Haushofer's fears for the future of Germany."

Nazi Admiral, Friend of Hess, Commits Suicide

LONDON, May 31.—(AP)—Norwegian sources in London said tonight a German Admiral Bohn, described as a Nazi naval commander in chief in Norway and a friend of Rudolf Hess, recently committed suicide in Oslo after a visit from Gestapo Chief Heinrich Himmler.

These circles said reliable information from Norway was to the effect that Bohn's friendship with Adolf Hitler's deputy fuhrer, who flew to Scotland May 10, figured in the admiral's talks with Himmler.

The suicide was said to have occurred in a hotel in Oslo, capital of German-occupied Norway.

Flames Slightly Damage Old Abandoned Barn

An old abandoned barn located beyond the pavement on South Kane street, Roseburg, caught fire this morning and resulted in a general alarm. The barn, only slightly damaged by the fire, has resulted in expense to the city of a considerably greater amount than the original cost of the structure. The fire department has answered four alarms to quell fires believed to have been caused by juvenile smokers. Today's fire is believed to have started from sparks blown from a nearby bonfire.

Mishap Kills Salesman Well Known in Roseburg

J. E. (Ed) Monteith, Eugene, well known in Roseburg, died at Eugene Friday night as the result of injuries received earlier in the day in an automobile accident near Harrisburg. Mr. Monteith, who was 33 years of age, was a paper salesman for the Pioneer Grocery company and in that capacity was a frequent visitor in Roseburg.

He was injured while riding in a car driven by Byron F. Forbes, Portland. The car went off the approach to the bridge over the Willamette river just outside the city of Harrisburg.

New Head Named for County Welfare Board

Miss Margaret White has been appointed administrator for the Douglas County Public Welfare commission. It was announced here today. She succeeds Darlow Johnson, who recently was called to the state office to direct field work for the state commission.

Miss White has been employed in the local welfare office for several years as a case worker.
