

Two Oil Firms, 5 Men Fined For Gas Price Plot

MADISON, Wis., June 3.—(AP)—Two oil companies and five individuals were fined a total of \$20,000 by Federal Judge Lindley yesterday on charges they conspired in 1935 and 1936 to raise and fix retail gasoline prices at artificial high levels in violation of the Sherman anti-trust law.

The defendants, convicted at the close of a 16-week trial held in 1937-38, had been granted retrials. They changed their pleas of "not guilty" to no defense today.

Charges against two individuals were dismissed on recommendation of Grant W. Kelleher, special U. S. district attorney.

Fines were imposed as follows: Standard Oil Company of Indiana, \$5,000; Cities Service Oil Company, \$5,000; Alexander Fraser, president of Shell Oil Co., \$2,500; A. G. Maguire, vice president of the Wadhams division of Socony-Vacuum Oil Co., \$1,500; Edward J. Bullock, vice president of Standard Oil of Indiana, \$2,500; Oscar J. Tuttle, sales executive of Cities Service, \$2,000; H. J. Kennedy, of the Continental Oil Company, \$1,500.

Cases against H. E. Brandt and H. O. Fruess, both of Cities Service, were dismissed.

Oregon Defense Council Named By Governor Sprague

SALEM, June 3.—(AP)—Governor Sprague announced yesterday the appointment of a 27-member advisory state council of defense, which will supervise the enlistment of thousands of Oregon citizens in volunteer defense activities.

Governor Sprague will be chairman of the council, with Ross T. McIntyre of Portland as vice-chairman. Jerrold Owen, executive secretary of the world war veterans state aid commission, will be coordinator.

"The purpose of the advisory council," the governor said, "is to reflect public opinion over the state and to lend counsel in the development of public policies respecting Oregon's participation in defense activities."

"As the war emergency tightens, our loads are bound to increase, and this body of representative citizens should be able to play an important part in helping Oregon make its contribution to the national defense."

As coordinator, Owen will maintain offices in the state military department in Salem. He will devote most of his time to council work, but he also will retain his present job.

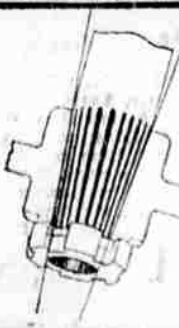
