cant that British officialdom was silent on the situation in Syria.

Axis "Ready For U. S."

Meanwhile, the authoritative Fascist Editor Virginio Gayda, often a spokesman for Premier Mussolini, declared that Germany and Italy were ready for action against the United States if the United States entered the war.

Gayda said Hitler and Mussolini, in their latest meeting yesterday, discussed "new plans to follow a new cycle which is opening immediately for the victorious axis powers," and he added: "This is a time of action."

Cyprus Next Axis Target

Britain's days in the Mediterranean are numbered, Adolf Hitler's newspaper, Voelkischer Beobachter, declared today, focusing attention on the island of Cyprus as the next likely objective of Germany's armed forces.

Cyprus, the last British island stronghold in the eastern Mediterranean, serves as an advance base for naval and air units

guarding approaches to Palestine and Suez.

These sources noted with interest the order of the day issued by Reichsmarshal Hermann Goering last night, in which he congratulated the air force on the conquest of Crete and said it had proved Hitler's assertion that "there are no unconquerable islands."

Lumber Paralysis May Bring About Showdown

der an agreement signed yesterday.

A strike of the 87 boommen two weeks ago resulted in closing of the mills and enforced idleness for 4,000 men.

The agreement yesterday provided a wage increase of seven and one-half cents an hour, bringing the minimum daily wage to \$8.15. This increase was made retroactive to April 1. Union representatives and boom operators agreed to arbitrate demands for a week's vacation with pay, adjustment of starting times and overtime rates for irregular hours.

Wages Boosted by Chrysler

Seventy thousand Chrysler corporation workers at Detroit won wage increases and bonuses totaling \$15,000,000 last week, subject to ratification at meetings of the United Automobile Workers (CIO) membership.

The agreement, accepted by UAW leaders, calls for an 8-cent hourly wage boost and payment of a \$45 bonus in December to workers with one year's seniority. The old bonus was \$40, and Chrysler spokesmen noted the bonus increase substituted for vacations with pay in 1942.

The wage gain, added to a two-cent boost last November, was made retroactive to June 1. Corporation officials said the base prior to June 1 was 80 cents an hour.

Warehousemen Strike

Warehousemen struck on San Francisco bay yesterday for higher wages for women members of the CIO union.

The strike involved about 4,500 members of the warehouse union, of whom about one-sixth are women, and 190 warehouses in San Francisco and Oakland.

At many warehouses women pickets appeared on patrol. Warehouse operators said no attempt would be made to operate. The union asked at 10 cent increase for women workers; operators offered five cents. They now receive from 50 to 55 cents an hour.

The defense program did not appear to be an issue in the warehouse controversy, which involved the bay area's wholesale gro-

cery, dry goods, drug, liquor and similar industries.

The union involved was the warehouse branch of the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union.

Complying with a request of the national defense mediation board, the AFL bay cities metal trades council today ordered members of all metal crafts—except striking AFL machinists—back to work at the Bethlehem Shipbuilding company's plant here pending negotiation of grievances.

In penalties is necessary.

Some of the councilmen, however, felt that a minimum should be provided and made mandatory, claiming that at present there are too many violators who are escaping merely with a warning, even though their offenses are repeated. They expressed a desire for a clause which would make a fine mandatory, at least on second offense.

It was decided, however, to leave the penalty clause unchanged at present with the possibility that a future amendment may be made in the event the action of the city court in handling the enforcement is not satisfactory to the council.
