Cereals Needed On Farms of Oregon

Western Oregon still has a place for cereals under good farming practice, believes Dr. D. D. Hill, professor of farm crops at Oregon State college, who discussed this subject over KOAC recently.

While western Oregon produces in excess of 3,000,000 bushels of wheat annually, plus considerable barley, and more oats than wheat and barley combined, most of this grain is used for feed with little of it being milled or shipped out, he says.

Vital reasons for the continued production of some cereals west of the Cascades are that they are needed in many rotations which make possible the most profitable production of distinctive cash crops such as seed and fiber flax, says Dr. Hill. Cereals are also extensively used as nurse crops for legumes.
