## Trout Planted In Streams of Oregon

PORTLAND, June 5.—(AP)—The state game commission said today that crews are now planting spring Rainbow trout 4 to 5 inches long in eastern Oregon waters from the Oak Springs hatchery.

Small native cutthroat trout from the Bandon hatchery are being liberated in high tributary streams of coastal waters in southwestern Oregon.

These are to be followed, the commission said, by liberations of Rainbow and eastern brook trout from the Union hatchery into eastern and southeastern Oregon waters, large native cutthroat in waters of the Alsea river system from the Alsea station and yearling spring Rainbow into south central Oregon waters from the Klamath hatchery.

The following recent liberations in various parts of the state were announced: Rainbow trout from Oak Springs and Klamath hatcheries, native cutthroat from the Alsea hatchery, chinook salmon from the federal Butte Falls hatchery, brood Rainbow trout from the McKenzie hatchery and yearling Rainbow from the Roaring river hatchery.

Six tank trucks and a number of pack strings are being used to reach the planting areas.
