

### Brooklyn Dodgers, Idle, Regain Lead Of National League

Simply by staying in out of the wet while their chief rivals were fumbling themselves into defeat, the Brooklyn Dodgers have climbed back into the leadership of the National League. They are now a half-game in front of the St. Louis Cardinals, who dropped a 4-to-2 decision to the Boston Braves in one of the three games played in the big leagues yesterday.

The Cards' infield, regarded by many observers as the one questionable spot in an otherwise great team, committed three errors to present the Braves with the same number of unearned runs and the margin of victory.

The St. Louis Browns, playing their last game under manager Fred Haney, wallowed the unfortunate Washington Senators 7 to 4 and thereby climbed to the dizzy height of seventh place in the American league.

The Chicago White Sox observed "Connie Mack" night by wallowing his Philadelphia Athletics, 6-1, behind the five-hit pitching of Thornton Lee.

### Three-Truck Collision Kills One Man, Injures Another

ASTORIA, Ore., June 5.—(AP)—A three-truck collision on a smoky highway yesterday killed Alvin M. Kelly, 35, Tacoma log truck driver, and injured another man.

John Dawson, driving one of the trucks, told police he slowed to 12 miles an hour after encountering a dense smoke pall on the coast highway six miles north of Seaside. The smoke came from a roadside fire.

Kelly, driving the following truck, crashed into the rear of Dawson's machine and a log, rammed forward by the impact, sheared off the truck cab and crushed him to death.

Guy French, driving a third truck, struck the wreckage and suffered serious burns on one leg in the resulting fire.

Hal Turpin, hero of the fray, chalked up a 2 to 0 win and delivered the blow that sent over the runs. It was the first shut-out defeat of the Coast league baseball season for Sacramento.

Turpin was touched for ten hits but managed to scatter them in all but one inning. The Senators got four successive singles in the seventh but two men were thrown out on bases.

Kleinke pitched four-hit ball, two of the hits coming in the eighth inning on both ends of a walk and a sacrifice. It was at this point that Turpin got the hit that drove across the two runs—a clean single to center.

### Partial Tax Exemption On Oregon Homes Sought

PORTLAND, June 4.—(AP)—Home owners sought a constitutional amendment here today to provide a \$2000 property tax exemption on owner-occupied homes. Claiming 3000 signatures al-

ready, the Home Owners' Tax Exemption league circulated initiative petitions throughout the state. To gain place on next year's ballot, 25,385 signatures are needed.

C. H. Ager, league president, said the petitions were a result of a recent state tax commission ruling that the variable ratio assessment system, which taxed homes at only a portion of full value, was illegal.

A similar proposal by The Dalles Veterans of Foreign Wars post would grant \$5000 exemptions, a 40-mill property tax limitation and a 2 per cent sales tax to offset property tax reduc-

tions. The resolution will be carried before the state V. F. W. convention at Bend June 18-21.

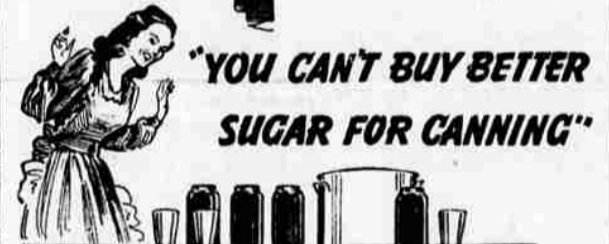
