

Oil Restrictions Near, Ickes Says; Power Supply Low

WASHINGTON, June 5.—(AP)—Petroleum Administrator Ickes declared today restrictions on oil consumption in the east was "probable" within a month. He added the hope if severe measures become necessary they would be undertaken on a voluntary basis.

The deficiency of oil in the populous east, Ickes said, might become so critical that not only gasless Sundays might be necessary but might mean "that we can't drive for pleasure on any day."

Restrictions now appeared necessary only in the east, he added.

Ickes strongly urged immediate application of daylight saving time to the whole country, and criticized C. W. Kellogg, president of the Edison Electric Institute, and chief of power for the office of production management, for his recent statement that "the power situation will be found to have been adequately provided for."

There is a power shortage now, Ickes told his press conference, and it promises to become worse. He said the impending curtailment of oil consumption in the east was being "definitely discussed" on a patriotic appeal basis, rather than by compulsion.

"It worked out that way the last time," he said, "and it probably would work again."
