into details, because, he said, it might disclose how he got his information. But it does come, he said, from the German propaganda bureau in Berlin.

Asked about published reports that the Japanese ambassador, Nomura, had been discussing the possibility of a non-aggression pact with Secretary Hull, the president said he knew nothing about it.

Not Deceived by Hitler.

In referring to an order to stress the idea Germany had no thought of doing anything against a western hemisphere nation, Mr. Roosevelt said this was carried again today by some newspapers.

The New York Times, for example, he said, printed an article by John Cudahy, former ambassador to Belgium and Luxembourg, relating an interview he had had with Adolf Hitler.

But he said the Times also had carried an editorial today, which he thought was good enough for the press of the country to repeat, evaluating past German assurances and expressing the hope that there would not be a large number of persons duped in this country.

The Times editorial concluded with a line saying, "he (Hitler) is always the best friend of the next nation on his list for plunder."

Secretary Hull also was asked about the reported talks with the Japanese. He said American policy in the Pacific remained unchanged and left a clear implication that any improvement in relations with Japan depended upon actions of the government at Tokyo.

Ship Seizure Bill Signed.

President Roosevelt signed today legislation permitting the government to take over and operate the approximately 80 foreign ships now idle in American waters.

He immediately thereafter or-

dered the maritime commission to carry out terms of the act.

Mr. Roosevelt said he did not know whether any French vessels would be included in the seizure.

The measure, sponsored by the administration, provides that the government can acquire ships by requisition or purchase or may charter them for the duration of the emergency. "Fair compensation" would be made to the owners, but funds paid would be held in the treasury for possible application against foreign debts to this country.

One restriction forbids the government from taking over, except by outright purchase, any vessels which actually were owned by a foreign government upon the outbreak of the war, September 3, 1939. Only an Italian tanker and a small Danish training ship fall into this category.

Besides those two vessels, foreign ships in American harbors are as follows: 35 Danish, 14 French, two German, 24 Estonian, 25 Italian, one Lithuanian and one Rumanian. The French vessels include the giant luxury liner Normandie, pride of France's pre-war merchant fleet, which now is tied up in New York.

Counter Blows Struck In Mediterranean Area

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night was confined to a light raid by a few planes on parts of Scotland.

German air raiders, striking at heavily protected British convoys off the east coast of Scotland last night, sank three merchant ships totaling 15,800 tons and damaged four others, the Berlin high command reported today.

The communique reported no British air activity over Germany or German-occupied territory yesterday either by day or night.

The British admiralty announced today that the royal navy had sunk three supply ships and an armed trawler intended to supply the German battleship Bismarck

and other Nazi warships.

In African land fighting, Italian forces were said to have repulsed a British attack in the Salum zone, while a group of British soldiers, commanded by an officer, who fled the island of Crete in a motorboat, were said to have been captured in the Bardia zone.

An Italian torpedo boat downed a British submarine in the central Mediterranean, the high command said.

The newspaper Il Piccolo carried a dispatch from Africa today asserting that two American tanks, identified as "Mark Two," had been put out of action in a recent British attack from the beleaguered port of Tobruk.

coal industry a recommended new contract embodying the uniform \$7 daily wage and 10-day paid vacation demands of the CIO United Mine Workers, and called for acceptance or rejection by 6 p. m. Monday.

Handed back to 12,000 striking CIO woodsmen for reconsideration the board's twice-rejected formula for peace in more than 50 Douglas fir operations in the Pacific northwest.

Suspended for the time being its efforts to mediate the day-old strike of the United Automobile Workers (CIO) at North American Aviation corporation, so that union chiefs could return to Inglewood, Calif., and consult with local unionists on the stoppage of work on \$196,000,000 in war-plane orders.

Murray Raps CIO Leaders.

President Philip Murray of the CIO sent a strongly worded personal message to the Puget Sound lumber strikers last night urging acceptance of the mediation board peace formula and castigating their union leaders. The board itself merely reaffirmed its stand on the back-to-work terms and said it hoped "proper understanding" would bring about acceptance.

Murray, a member of the board, described Orton's recent denunciation of the mediation agency as "a most reprehensible, lying defamation." Orton had accused the board of "bulldozing" and "strike breaking" tactics.

The I. W. A. strikers seek a general 7½-cent hourly wage increase, closed shop, and other demands. The board recommended the pay raise, with other terms to be fixed after a fact-finding survey of the industry. Common labor now gets 67½ cents an hour.

WAREHOUSE STRIKE IN PORTLAND PARTLY BROKEN

PORTLAND, June 6.—(AP)—Negotiations for a new contract continued today after 100 AFL warehousemen, office workers, salesmen and drivers halted their strike yesterday at three large produce houses.

Warehousemen, demanding a 40-hour week and pay increases from \$30 to \$35 weekly, struck Tuesday noon. Returning workers are employed by the Hudson-Duncan, Safeway and United companies, which offered 20 percent pay increases for the 40-hour week.

Another 100 workers remained idle at the Pacific Fruit & Produce company, where union spokesmen said the firm was holding out for continuation of the old 45 13-hour week.

Meantime, Portland's bakery and casket factory strikes continued.

SPOKANE MILL WORKERS GRANTED INCREASE

SPOKANE, June 6.—(AP)—A strike of 400 members of the lumber and sawmill workers union (AFL) ended last night at the Western Pine Manufacturing company. Work was to resume today on \$300,000 worth of defense contracts.

E. S. Jackson, of Seattle, U. S. department of labor conciliator, said the union and the company had agreed on a 52½-cent hourly minimum wage, effective August 15, and also two blanket raises of 2½ cents each to be effective June 15 and July 15. The agreement also includes a closed shop and a week's vacation with pay, he said.

The union, claiming that minimum wages in the plant were 45 cents an hour, struck a week ago for a 10-cent raise and other concessions.

WAGE BOOST ENDS STRIKE IN S. F. BAY DISTRICT

SAN FRANCISCO, June 6.—(AP)—A compromise wage settlement reached with employers, the CIO, longshoremen's and warehousemen's union yesterday sent its 4,500 San Francisco bay district warehouse workers back to the jobs from which they marched Monday.

The contract provides 10-cent an hour wage increases for men

workers, 7½-cent raises for women, and designated Monday through Friday as the standard work week, with overtime pay for Saturday work.

KAMATH FALLS CAFES FACE STRIKE THREAT

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 6.—(AP)—A strike to enforce wage demands at nine Klamath Falls restaurants was voted last night, 248-2, by members of the culinary alliance, G. C. Tatman, secretary of the union announced today.

Tatman said the strike would be called Saturday at 2 p. m. Other local eating houses, he said, had agreed to a new contract which grants increases of 50 cents a day on all classes of work, the new scale ranging from \$3.50 for waitresses to \$7 for male cooks.

A rejected compromise offer by the Restaurant and Caterers' association, which would have granted the raise to all except waitresses and dishwashers who would receive a 20-cent increase.

Mine Labor Proof Fee Back to \$1 After June 14

Douglas county miners who wait until after June 14th to record proof of labor will be required to pay a fee of \$1 instead of the existing fee of 25 cents, County Clerk Roy Agee announced today. The fiscal mining year ends June 30 and proof of labor must be filed by that date. The fee originally was \$1 but was reduced in 1939 to 25 cents and has remained at the lower figure during the past two years. The original fee, however, was restored at the last legislative session and becomes effective June 14. All persons filing proof before that date will pay only 25 cents, but from and after June 14 the recording fee will be \$1, the county clerk states.
