Logging Operator at Yoncalla Draws \$25 Fine

The first arrest of the season for violation of the seasonal rules pertaining to logging equipment has been made at Yoncalla, it was reported today from the headquarters of the Douglas Forest Protective association. F. M. Bigelow of Yoncalla was fined \$25 in justice court at Drain for conducting a logging operation without the required forest operation permit and for not providing proper fire equipment, it was stated.

Part-Year Car Licenses Available After June 15

Authority for the issuance of quarterly and half-year licenses on motor vehicles for which such types of licenses are provided was received at the sheriff's office today. The term licenses will be obtainable on and after June 15. After July 1, it is announced, the new law becomes effective permitting a flat \$5 fee on commercial type vehicles up to 4,500 pounds. Heretofore the weight limit was 4,000 pounds.
