New Oregon Laws Go Into Effect On June 14th

SALEM, June 13.—(AP)—Oregon will have 386 new laws June 14, but the average citizen won't realize it because few of them affect his daily life.

The bills were among the 488 passed by the 1941 legislature. The rest became effective on passage because they contained emergency clauses.

The one that affects John Public more than any other increases the highway speed limit from 45 to 55 miles an hour, and shifts the burden of proof from the officer to the driver.

Tourists won't have to register any more when they enter the state, and the price of driver's licenses goes up from \$1 to \$1.50. Hospitals get the extra 50 cents to care for indigent accident victims.

Other laws becoming effective at midnight tonight include: Creating a fourth congressional district, permitting employers who have stable payrolls to pay smaller unemployment taxes, barring from the ballot all persons who advocate overthrow of the government by force, and authorizing the governor to create a state guard.

New Game Laws Included.

New game laws to which the emergency clause was not attached, become effective June 14. Perhaps the most important of these laws concerns men and women over 65 years who have been residents of the state of Oregon for 10 years or more. This law provides that if such persons will swear to an affidavit before a county judge or chairman of the board of county commissioners that he or she is unable to pay the regular \$5 fee for a combination fishing and hunting license, a special license will be issued for 50 cents. Special affidavit blanks have been furnished to all county judges in the state or may be obtained upon application to the Oregon state game commission, 616 Oregon building, Portland.

Nazi Losses In Cretan, Balkan Campaigns Cited

BERLIN, June 12.—(AP)—The German army and air force seizure of Crete on Adolf Hitler's personal orders cost 5,893 officers and men in dead, wounded and missing, the high command announced today, and proved that "nothing is impossible to the German soldier."

The announcement also claimed that between Jan. 1 and May 30 thirty allied warships were sunk in the Mediterranean, including 23 at Crete, and that "a great number of other units, including several battleships and plane carriers" were damaged.

In the same five-month period, 103 merchant ships, totaling more than 520,000 tons were sunk in the Mediterranean.

The Nazi casualties listed for the Crete campaign were those of the German army and air force.

The Germans reported 592 allied planes destroyed in the battle of Crete—417 ground, in the first stages of the battle, 167 in air fights and eight by anti-aircraft fire.

As for their own losses, the Germans acknowledged only 236. Also reviewing the Balkan campaign—the conquest of Yugoslavia and Greece—the high command announced that a preliminary count of prisoners showed about 14,500 officers and nearly 560,000 men—Yugoslavs, British imperial troops and Greeks—in German custody.

Mott Threatens To Vote Against Roads Aid Slash

WASHINGTON, June 12.—(AP)—Rep. Mott (R., Ore.) said in an interview that unless the house roads committee amended the Hayden-Carmody roads appropriation bill to provide \$287,000,000 the full amount recommended by John M. Carmody, federal works administrator, he would oppose the measure on the floor.

The bill appropriates such an amount for roads as the president may deem necessary but the executive in a recent message to congress asked that the appropriation for access roads be held to \$100,000,000 and for strengthening strategic highways to \$25,000,000.

Carmody had recommended to the president not less than \$150,000,000 be appropriated for access roads, the entire cost of which would be paid by the federal government, \$25,000,000 for tactical roads, \$100,000,000 for strategic highways and \$12,000,000 for advance planning for strategic highways.

He also urged that a more liberal policy of allocating the strategic highway funds be followed than the usual 50-50 program through which the states matched federal funds.

Mott was one of the leaders last year in forcing increase in highway funds and said he felt all of the money recommended by Carmody should be spent.

"The \$125,000,000 recommended by the president is entirely inadequate to meet our road situation," Mott said. "I have told the house public roads committee that unless it is amended to provide the full amount recommended by Carmody I shall vote against it in committee and vote against it when it reaches the floor of the house."

Germany Defiant In Robin Moor Torpedoing

Moore's survivors gave a dramatic recital of the U-boat attack in the south Atlantic on May 21.

Halted at 6 a. m. by the Nazi raider's blinker lights, the Robin Moor was first torpedoed amidships and then sent to the bottom amid a hail of shell-fire. Passengers were given 30 minutes to abandon ship.

Previously, it was stated, the Robin Moor's first mate had rowed a mile and a half to the waiting U-boat, as ordered, and personally informed the German commander of the ship's nationality and destination.

Berlin dispatches said the German public was still kept in the dark about the episode, and Nazi authorities said they had no proof that a German submarine was involved.

Blame Plainly Evident

Welles was asked for comment on the statement of a German spokesman in Berlin that "we won't be buffaloed by American and English discussions concerning the Robin Moor" and that "whenever any ship with contraband sails for England we'll shoot at it."

Welles replied that the question of what constitutes contraband is one of the most controversial in all the world and that the American government had never acquiesced in contraband definitions of either side in the present war.

He asserted today that the facts in the sinking of the Robin Moor were beyond dispute and indirectly accused Germany of violating an international treaty on submarine warfare.

The evidence of 11 survivors of the sunken American merchant vessel was very clear and there could be no dispute as to the facts, he said.

As to what action the United States will take, Welles said he would withhold a considered statement until the full depositions of the 11 survivors were received from American officials in Brazil and were investigated here.

one after the other, over a period of ten minutes as though a store of ammunition had been hit."

Counter Raid Repulsed.

At home the RAF fighter command was reported to have turned back a formation of Messerschmitts, retaliation-bent, in a five-minute battle 20,000 feet above the southeast English coast this afternoon.

Several sharp bursts of cannon fire were heard and, after one long burst, a plane dived with a loud scream that died over the sea.

While the bomber command was attacking the smoky Ruhr, planes of the coastal command attacked docks at Brest, France, and Antwerp, Belgium, and also targets near Rotterdam, The Netherlands. One plane failed to return.

As a result of the air war during May, the British ministry of home security announced, casualties in Britain were 5,394 persons killed and 5,181 injured. In the preceding month the casualties were 6,065 persons killed and 6,926 injured.
