to take a bad licking, look for the Germans to go in for blood.

IN London "usually reliable sources" report receipt of information that the Germans are massing troops, artillery and aircraft in Poland and Rumania for a war of nerves designed to wrest further concessions from Russia.

What concessions? Baku oil and Ukraine wheat, for one thing. Also, maybe, a land route by-passing Turkey's two million bayonets to the east, leading down through Iran to take Britain's Iraq forces in the rear.

Your map will indicate the possibilities of such a route.

If such a scheme is in the wind, will Russia fight or submit? If you can answer that question accurately, you are one of the world's best informed persons.

A STRAW in the wind: Near Tobruk German dive bombers, attacking in force and fiercely, sink a British gunboat and a monitor.

When the shooting starts again on a grand scale, the vicinity of Tobruk will be one of the places.

That way lies the road to the Nile from the west.

AND you can be very sure it won't be long before the shooting starts on a grand scale again.

OUR own state department says today that according to an American consular report the Robin Moor (American ship) was sunk by a German submarine in the south Atlantic and that the German commander was "fully aware that the ship was American."

Keep your eye on the Robin Moor sinking. It is one of these "incidents" that are important out of all proportion to their physical dimensions.

Local authorities may make different limits but whatever limit is set must be duplicated.

The highway commission is permitted to increase or decrease the 55 m. p. h. speed in its discretion which change shall be effective when appropriate signs giving notice thereof are erected.

The penalties of the new law are in substance as follows: (1) Violation of the basic rule although not exceeding specified speed limits: Up to \$25 fine or five days imprisonment, or both.

"Nor shall any person drive at a speed which is greater than will permit the driver to exercise proper control of the vehicle and to decrease speed or stop as may be necessary to avoid colliding with any person, vehicle or other conveyance on or entering the highway in compliance with legal requirements and with the duty of drivers and other persons using the highway to exercise due care; provided that this provision shall not be construed to change the rules of pleading and evidence relating to negligence and contributory negligence."

Moves to Portland - Lee Blakeley, employee at the Umpqua hotel for the last three years, has moved to Portland, where he has accepted employment.

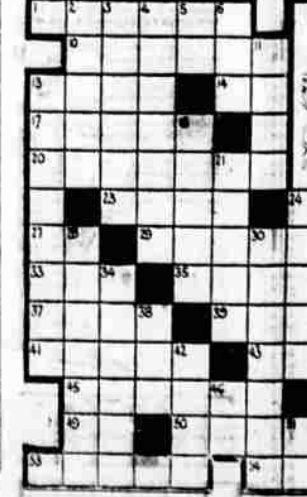

DAVID SMITH, JR., WINS NATIONAL HONOR AS PIANIST

David Smith, Jr., brilliant 16-year-old pianist, son of Mr. and Mrs. David Smith of Roseburg has been chosen by the National Federation of Music Clubs as the most outstanding junior musician in America and will be guest of honor and featured soloist in the Shrine auditorium in Los Angeles, Calif., June 21, Junior day at the Biennial National Federation of Music Clubs convention. Representatives from North and South America will take part in this great convention during the week June 18 to June 25. A massed junior symphony orchestra, composed of some of the most gifted junior musician in the country will also take part in the Junior day festivities. David is the young pianist who won the acclaim of the jury with first honors in the national Edgar Stillman Kelly scholarship auditions in New York City this year. He competed with violinists, singers and pianists from all parts of the United States and was the unanimous choice of the judges for first prize. May 29, 1941, David was the recipient of another great honor when he won first place in the Schaler Evans piano contest for being the most outstanding pianist in the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music. (No age limit), where he is a piano student of Dr. Karl Liszewski. He is also an outstanding student at Walnut Hills college preparatory school and a member of the Ohio state champion swimming team. He recently made his triumphant artistic debut in Cincinnati as soloist with the Cincinnati Symphony orchestra. The United States government has authorized an arrangement whereby six religious and philanthropic organizations, including Catholic, Jewish and Protestant groups, are united to form the United Service Organizations for National Defense, Inc. USO is made responsible for recreational and other leadership in buildings erected by government adjacent to military camps. A sum of \$10,675,000 is to be raised by private subscription to finance the program. In view of the prevalence of vice and gambling near the army camps, this plan is commendable. Better still would be that the federal government close all illegal commercial enterprises operating near military camps. The church was the first to protest against vicious conditions surrounding army camps. The government cannot dodge its responsibility by erecting buildings for the use of religious agencies. The draftees are being exploited and the nation's defenses are being undermined. It is poor business to spend billions in training men and then allow private vice interests to ruin them for profit, and make them incapable of discharging their duty if actually called into service.
