U. S. Flag Honored In Program Here

An inspirational flag day program was presented in Roseburg Saturday evening under sponsorship of the Elks lodge, with a large attendance on the part of the general public.

The observance started with a parade, which included the colors, born by a group of Boy Scouts, the Roseburg Municipal band, the Eagles drum corps, women's drill team, men's drill team, and the American Legion drum corps.

From the balcony at the Elks lodge hall, where the parade halted, a brief program was presented, with Adrian Fisher as master of ceremonies. The program opened with the raising of the flag, and the pledge of allegiance, led by Scout Bob Elliott. The invocation was given by the Rev. Perry Smith. Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly presented to the Elks lodge a large flag, given by Grant Wilcox. Attorney Paul Geddes read the history of the flag of the United States, as presented in lodge ritual.

In a brief talk, which followed the singing of "God Bless America" by the audience, led by the band, the Rev. Mr. Smith, past national chaplain of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, gave a brief but inspirational talk, in which he urged the benefits of the American form of government and urged allegiance to the flag and the principals for which it stands, together with an offensive against those who would destroy those principles.

The program closed with the singing of "America."

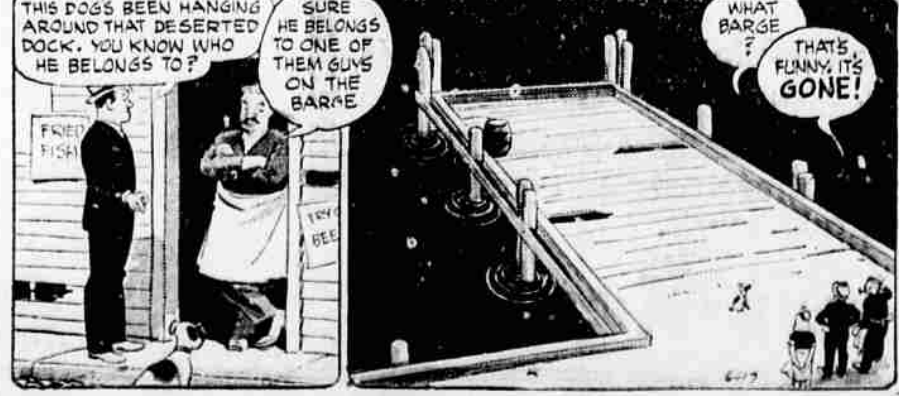
