Change in Filing Birth Certificates Is Cited

Under the terms of a law passed by the last legislature and becoming effective June 14, all filings of delayed birth certificates will be handled by the state board of health, it was reported today by Roy Agee, county clerk. Previously applications and filings were conducted through the county clerk and county judge, and were certified to the board of health. Under the new law,

however, all applications must be made directly to the vital statistics department of the state board of health. The law provides that persons born in Oregon and having no record of birth may file required data and have a certificate placed on record.
