## W. S. OF C. S. HAS ENJOYABLE MEETING

SUTHERLIN, June 18.—The Women's Society of Christian Service met in the church parlors, Thursday afternoon, June 12, in the interest of Aid business. Mrs. Stella French had charge of the devotionals beginning with the hymn, "Jesus Calls Us," followed by a prayer by Rev. L. G. Weaver. She then read a few words and two poems taken from the "Upper Room." Mrs. French also conducted the business meeting at which time various things were discussed. A number of calls on sick people and new comers were recorded. The meeting closed for a social program consisting of a talk on Peru by Mrs. Edward Sarmiento, whose husband is a native of that country. The talk was a very interesting one and the following are some of the points Mrs. Sarmiento brought out: Peru is one-fifth the size of Oregon with three distinct climates, hot, temperate and cold. Lima, the capital, is a very beautiful city, often called the city of kings with streets that were once paved with pure gold. There still stands today a beautiful cathedral which was built 400 years ago and which required 90 years to build and is still well preserved. Peru supports a university of high standing, all white children go to private schools which are very good. Languages are stressed, therefore it is not uncommon for people to be accomplished in several. The houses are large, a twenty-room house being considered small. Land is cheap and taxes are low. Servants are many as they are inexpensive and are loyal to the one specified job they are to do. One dollar will purchase food for thirty people, meat is especially cheap. It is the habit of the people to be late to all functions, it being unmanly to arrive on time. Women do not go out, even one block, without an escort. Theaters are popular though the pictures are highly censored. Those in mourning wear black and refrain from public life for a long period of time, perhaps for life. If there happens to be sickness in the family the remainder of the group refrain from mingling with the public. Families are large, and clothes, especially silk, are expensive. South American countries keep much to themselves since the high mountains form natural barriers, and roads are few. Peru soon hopes to have a highway through its own country. Most of the Peruvians are Catholics and very devoted to their religion, there are a few Protestants, however, who belong to the Church of England or the Adventist. Economical problems are severe due to war conditions, cotton and oil are spoiling since England is not buying as formerly. Peru was buying lumber from Oregon but a lot of that trade has been lost due to strikes. The government builds homes and rents them cheap to the needy. The government maintains the hospitals. Social laws are good protection for workers. Prices on luxuries are high, on other commodities they

are low. One side light: Women have little feet, number two shoes being the average size sold, this is due to women taking very little exercise since the servants do all of the work. The younger generation, however, is playing tennis and taking part in other athletics.
