Service in Roseburg

The big tri-motored airliner making passenger flights from the Roseburg airport yesterday

will be held over today and to-night on account of the rain yesterday and by popular request. Almost 200 local residents took to the air yesterday for trial flights in the five-ton "Monterey Clipper." Fred Kane, veteran pilot of 12,000 air hours, will again be at the controls. Kane has flown 21 years and has carried a half million passengers in perfect safety, according to Alton Walker, manager of the western tour, sponsored by All-American Airways, whose company is offering these educational flights to encourage and promote travel by air. Flights will continue until 10:30 o'clock tonight. A five-passenger open plane accompanies the airliner for those desiring more thrilling rides.
