

Nazi-Turkey Treaty Is Triumph in Diplomacy

of the Ukraine "for the time being."

3. That Russia "liberate" the Baltic countries of Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania—annexed by Russia last year—and withdraw her troops beyond a line of demarcation to be fixed by Germany.

In this connection, it was recalled that reports from Helsinki yesterday said Russia was withdrawing troops from the soviet military base at Hanko, Finland, Yugoslav military and diplomatic attaches who left Moscow recently were quoted as saying Stalin had admitted that a German invasion might come this summer—and that if it did, "the enemy will get hit in the face."

Russia or Suez—Which.

The German-Turkish accord was interpreted by informed quarters in London today as virtually an infallible portent of a tremendous new Nazi military stroke. But the question remained whether it would be aimed at soviet Russia or Suez.

These sources asserted that the pact fits well into the now familiar German practice of isolating intended blitzkrieg victims by cajolery or by threats against their neighbors.

"By the conquest of Crete, occupation of the Aegean islands and domination of the frontier of Turkish Thrace, Hitler has been in a position to enforce the original heavy demands he made on the Turks," London sources said.

"But Turkey would have chosen to fight instead and, despite the country's lack of equipment, that would have been a bitter campaign. Evidently Hitler was impatient to get any kind of an understanding so he could proceed to quick action elsewhere, evidently believing he would be free at some later date really to make Turkey come to terms."

These sources declared that "perhaps the greatest potential menace" was Turkey's agreement to control her press and radio, both of which have been friendly to Britain and hostile toward Russia.

Wonder was expressed as to how they would be able now to maintain friendly relations with both sides. The pact was seen, nevertheless, as a guarantee for the safety of Germany's Balkan flank if Nazi forces attacked Russia.

California to Execute First Woman Tomorrow

SAN QUENTIN, Calif., June 19.—(AP)—The duchess dies tomorrow.

Barring improbable last minute reprieve, Evelita Juanita Spinelli, 52, mistress of a hoodlum gang, will die in the gas chamber at San Quentin prison—first woman to be executed legally in the state of California.

Described at her trial as a former member of the notorious Detroit "purple gang," she was convicted with three of her confederates of murdering a fifth.

Death on Feet Better Than Life on Knees—F. R.

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., June 19.—(AP)—Responding by proxy to a precedent-shattering award to an honorary degree by Oxford university at Harvard, President Roosevelt asserted today that "we * * * would rather die on our feet than live on our knees."

"We, too, born to freedom and believing in freedom, are willing to fight to maintain freedom," the chief executive said in a message of response to a citation read by Lord Halifax, the British ambassador and chancellor of Oxford.

The honorary doctorate of civil laws was awarded to Mr. Roosevelt at a dramatic ceremony held only a few minutes after Harvard, the United States' oldest university, had awarded an honorary doctorate of laws to Lord Halifax as a representative of a "stalwart nation unyielding before the blows of tyranny."

night and that there were casualties and damages in residential areas of Hamburg and Bremen.

Two British merchantmen totalling 5,000 tons were sunk from

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a strongly protected convoy off the British east coast in overnight air operations, the German high command reported today.

The east coast port of Great Yarmouth also was hammered in a night air attack and airports in southeastern England were raided, the communiqué said.

The communiqué claimed a bag of 12 British planes in raids on Germany and occupied areas.

War Blows In Africa

The Italian high command reported today that axis warplanes were hammering British troops retreating after the battle of Salum while land forces continued to round up prisoners and abandoned equipment.

Altogether the British were said to have lost about 200 tanks and 42 planes in the three-day battle.

The besieged British garrison

at the Libyan port of Tobruk and the British railroad at Matruh in the Egyptian desert east of Salum were bombed anew by axis planes, the communiqué said.

The Italians acknowledged the British had again bombed the Libyan port of Bengasi.
