A public school in the art of handling fly and bait rods and lures will be conducted by Haslett on the courthouse lawn in Roseburg from 4 to 7 p. m. Tuesday, June 24.

This event is free to all sportsmen. A complete showing of the finest in fishing tackle, sportswear and equipment will be on display, but emphasis is placed on the fact that nothing displayed is offered for sale and no orders for equipment are taken, as the school is purely informative.

"Doc" Haslett and his lovely wife, Esther, are employed by a group of tackle and sportswear companies as good will representatives. Course in Forest Guarding Given 65 At Wolf Creek

Approximately sixty-five fire season employees of the Umpqua national forest last night completed a 10-day forest guard training school at Wolf creek camp on Little river. The school was particularly important this year, according to Ray B. Hampton of the Roseburg headquarters office, because of the fact that more than 50 per cent of the men who have been employed in past years and who thus were familiar with forest practices are now in military service or defense industries. This situation has made it necessary to provide an extensive training course for the many untrained men who will be employed this year.

The school was conducted by staff officers from Roseburg, district rangers, district protective assistants, CCC foremen and superintendents and others.

Among those who served as instructors were Rex Wilson, district ranger in charge of the Bohemia district; Fred Asam, North Umpqua district ranger; Avery Berry, South Umpqua district ranger, and Leroy Garwood, Diamond lake district ranger.

The four district protective assistants, Bruce Ferguson, South Umpqua; Charles Vasey, Bohemia; Jack Smith, Diamond lake, and Junior Mallory, North Umpqua, together with John McGilvray, South Umpqua CCC superintendent; Ernil Chaney, South Umpqua district guard, and CCC foremen, Grover Blake, Art Radigan and Carl Messing, also assisted with the instruction.

The school covered all phases of forest protective work, and departments were held for men engaged in each of the various work classifications.
