New War Serial Story Just Starting!

The Associated Press, of which this newspaper is a member, has engaged a staff of special writers and analysts to furnish background and comment on war developments.

Correspondent Fred Vanderschmidt, who has followed every war development—much of it as a first hand observer, gives the following commentary on Hitler's Russian adventure:

Winston Churchill's swift acceptance of the issues involved in Hitler's self-tagged holy war against Russia and his declaration that it will be Britain's policy to help the soviet union is a counter-stroke of strategy as bold as anything in his career.

He evaluates this attack, militarily, as a giant prelude to the attempted invasion of England, probably in 1942; as Hitler's attempt to destroy the watchful red armies at his back before United States aid is wholly effective in bracing the British Isles.

Strategically, Churchill sees clearly Hitler's belief that a German assault on Russia will weaken British and American will to fight back at Germany while Germany is, ostensibly, trying to destroy the fortress of world communism.

Witness the British prime minister's solemn warning to "all representatives of that vile race of quislings who make themselves the tools and agents of the nazi regime against their fellow countrymen and against the lands of their birth."

It would save trouble, says Churchill, if such people were disposed of by their fellow countrymen; at any rate, they "will be delivered by us on the morrow of victory to the justice of the allied tribunals."

Shrewdly, Churchill avoids any suggestion that Britain actually is allied, in a formal sense, with Russia, and he refuses to take back any of the bitter words he has directed at communism.

Moreover, he does not attempt to speak for the United States, which is the nation geographically and economically able to give Russia the most effective aid.

Besides, nobody in these parts is much concerned about who licks Stalin. We are strictly neutral in that respect, if not in others.

But we must remember that Stalin is LOOKING OUT FOR STALIN. He isn't going to sacrifice himself for somebody else's benefit.

He is fighting because he has decided that only by fighting can Russia hope to remain a world power.

LONDON says today (Thursday): "The German-Turkish accord was interpreted by informed quarters as virtually an infallible portent of a tremendous new nazi stroke. But the question at that time was whether it would be aimed at soviet Russia or Suez."

London HOPED it would be against Russia. It is quite possible nobody but Hitler actually knew where the next blow would fall.

(By the Associated Press) The Sacramento Senators have managed to uphold their right to the position of leader of the Coast league baseball. The Solons, after two losses to cellar-berthed Oakland, won a double-header from the Oaks yesterday, 9 to 6 and 2 to 1, and copped the series, 4 games to 3.

Sacramento went into the eighth inning with Oakland leading 4 to 1, then rallied and scored eight runs on seven hits and an error. Sacramento won the second game, which was tied at 1-1 at the end of the scheduled seven innings, in the eighth inning.

Seattle split a doubleheader with Los Angeles, the Angels taking the first game, 3 to 1, and Seattle winning the nightcap, 3 to 0. Both games were pitching duels and Bonetti allowed only five hits in the first game and shut out Seattle for the first eight innings.

Seattle was held to three hits by Stine in the second game, but Pitcher Brown of Seattle won his own game in the sixth by smacking out a home run with two on base. Brown allowed seven hits. Seattle won the series, 5 games to 2.
