Debunking Defunct Funk Bunk

TO do to the world what Germany is trying to do to it requires many kinds of men.

It requires street brawlers like Rudolf Hess to overawe physical opposition and beat helpless minority people into a bloody pulp.

Such a voice is that of Dr. Walter Funk, the shrewd "economic brain" of the reich.

So the plausible Dr. Funk is out with another of his frequent efforts to reassure an alarmed world.

Excessive nationalism, extreme autarchy, border trade barriers, says Dr. Funk, were part of the cause of economic collapse before the war.

The real aim of German policy, purrs Dr. Funk, is long-range co-operation of equal partners to eliminate depressions and make everybody in the world happy, happy, happy.

What "co-operation?" What "equal partners?" The kind of "co-operation" that France and Italy and Bulgaria and Hungary and Rumania are now giving Germany at gun point?

No, thank you. It may be, and it probably is necessary to remake the international economic mold of the world.

The eminently respectable Dr. Funk probably never clubbed a Jew in his life, probably never shot down a single man or woman standing in defense of their homes.

A LITTLE exchange of pleasantries has been going on between the Atlantian, the excellent magazine published by the inmates of Atlanta penitentiary, and Hitler's Voelkische Beobachter.

The Atlanta prisoners make certain articles useful in national defense. Three months ago they posted up an uncompromising cartoon of Hitler in their shops.

ers and Palestine Jews have been called in against us. But the mobilization of penitentiary inmates against Hitler remained for the American president to discover.

The Atlantian replied in its current issue: "Imagine THEM calling US thieves and murderers! . . . No wonder they look upon us through the slightly biased squint with which the big-timer naturally views the small-timer. . . . For once we're on the right side of the fence, even if it does enclose us."

For our money, the Atlanta prisoners win that round.

As between Hitler and Stalin, we're FOR STALIN—even if his coming into the fight does mess up our story of the embattled democracies fighting for their lives against the dictators.

THE Hitler-Stalin break forces a decision on Japan. What to do is the question that faces her right now.

What Japan DOES, not what she says, will be important. Japan is on a root. How she will get off remains to be seen.

A WORD of advice at this point: Let's not kid ourselves.

Hitler attacked Russia because he WANTED to. His purpose is to STRENGTHEN himself. Only time can tell whether he has been wise or foolish.

Corn Flakes Strawberry Ring Recipe Offered

(Serves 10) Heat: 14 cups brown sugar (not packed) in 1 1/2 pound (2 3/4 cup) butter (vitamins A, B, D). Use iron skillet over low flame.

Place: Mixture in well buttered 10x2 inch ring mold, packing very lightly. Allow to stand at room temperature just until mixture becomes cold.

Unfold: On round platter. When ready to serve, fill center with following mixture: Slice: 2 cups strawberries (vitamins A, B, C, G). Dredge with: 1 tablespoon sugar.
