

Yankees Take Lead From Cleveland In American League

(By the Associated Press)
For the first time since the season was in its infancy the New York Yankees are in first place in the American league today and now the pressure is on the Cleveland Indians.

The Yanks captured the lead yesterday by bumping the St. Louis Browns 7-5 while the third-place Boston Red Sox raided the Tribe 7-2.

Joe DiMaggio led the bombing in New York with a two-run homer that extended his hitting streak to 37 games, four short of the record, and made 20 consecutive contests in which one or more of the Yankees have hit home runs.

In Boston the Indians were set back on their heels by old Lefty Grove, who pitched seven-hit ball for the 29th victory of his long and illustrious career. Ted Williams rapped a two-run homer in the fourth and his mates put together a flock of doubles for five runs in the seventh.

The best one-game pitching show of the season, however, was staged at Washington yesterday when Rigney and Hudson struggled for 12 scoreless innings before the White Sox downed the Senators 2-0 in the 13th.
