Information For Recreationists

(Forest Service Bulletin)

North Umpqua: The North Umpqua road to Copeland creek is in good condition. Much of the road between Rock creek and Circle H lodge has been widened during the past few months, and the work near Rock creek is near completion. The Little river road is also in good condition. The campgrounds along both rivers have been maintained to accommodate the public over the Fourth of July holidays. Trout fishing is good in the North Umpqua and Little river; several limit catches have been reported. A few summer steelhead have also been taken in the Steamboat area. Although water conditions are rocky now, due to the almost continuous rains of the last week, it is expected the streams will clear sufficiently to insure some good catches over the holidays.

Bohemia: Bohemia lilies will soon be in bloom. The streams are high because of the rains, and the fishing is poor. Brice creek road is in fair condition, with the exception of some bad places at Crystal creek and Weaver creek.

Diamond lake: Roads in this area are in good condition, with no dust. The Copeland creek-Big Camas sector is under construction and impassable. Six hundred and ten thousand Diamond lake rainbow fry have been planted in the headwaters of the North Umpqua river by the Umpqua National forest and the state game commission during the past week. This work has been under the supervision of a trained junior biologist. Fishing is generally fair.

South Umpqua: Due to the heavy rains in this area, use of the forest roads is not advised. The upper South Umpqua road used in going to Fish lake is in poor condition. However, if good weather should prevail, it is expected that the road will be maintained by the July Fourth holidays.—Umpqua National Forest.
