A Fine Patriotic Plan

TO those who love to see Old Glory properly displayed, the news that Umpqua post of the American Legion is working on a plan to provide uniformity in the showing of flags in the business area is indeed welcome news. A majority of the flags still in use in the business area were purchased 10 or 12 years ago. Many of them have never been cleaned. Some are torn and frayed. Standards are of varying lengths, due frequently to having been broken by being hit by automobiles.

The American Legion post now proposes to provide uniform equipment to all places of business on a cost basis. The flags will be put in custody of the Boy Scouts, who will see that they are put out and collected on the proper holidays and special occasions. A very small fee is to be charged for this service.

Such a plan will save the merchant from rolling out of bed extra early on the morning of a holiday to put out his flag and will eliminate the practice of permitting a flag to remain out until late at night or even all night, as frequently occurs, in the event he should leave town for the day. Best of all, however, it will provide a uniformity of flags and standards at a minimum cost.

It is to be hoped that the American Legion post is given complete cooperation by the business houses of Roseburg, and that not only the downtown stores join in this enterprise, but that private individuals as well take advantage of this opportunity to obtain the home display kits the Legion post is providing.

IF you have some tears that just have to be shed you might drop one or two for the communists in America. They've certainly been kicked around.

In the days when communism and fascism were supposed to be deadly enemies, they had a good line. They were panning Hitler and standing up for Stalin and raising old Ned generally on the side. But always they were the noble foes of dread fascism.

Came then the Hitler-Stalin kiss and make up act. That left them out on a bad limb, but at least they went right on sabotaging this country's defense effort—which has been their real job.

NOW misfortune overwhelms them.

Over night, America and Russia become buddies, one for all and all for one against Hitler. The more ruckuses the communists stir up in America, the more American defense facilities they wreck, the more airplanes they

stop from coming off the production line "THE WORSE IT IS FOR STALIN!"

Life just seems to be "agin" the communists in this country.

Roosevelt Urges New Housing Fund

WASHINGTON, June 26.—(AP)—President Roosevelt proposed today that congress authorize spending of an additional \$300,000,000 on defense housing.

This would double the amount approved last October. In a special message to the legislators, Mr. Roosevelt suggested early consideration of his recommendation "in view of the urgency of this matter."

"Data have been presented to me," he said, "which indicate the possibility that the government should be prepared to undertake the construction of at least 125,000 additional defense homes between now and July 1, 1942."

"It is thought best, however, to limit the additional program to \$300,000,000 at this time, which will permit the construction of approximately 75,000 houses to fill the most urgent present needs."

Of the original \$300,000,000 authorized for defense housing, the chief executive said appropriations had been made to its full extent and practically all the money allocated to projects.

Umpqua S. and L. Elects Officers, Sets Dividend

S. J. Shoemaker was elected president of the Umpqua Savings and Loan association at the annual meeting of stockholders last night. M. E. Ritter was chosen vice-president; H. O. Pargeter, secretary-manager; V. J. Micelli, treasurer; Guy Cordon, attorney; Dan Koehane, substitute attorney. Directors elected for three years were H. O. Pargeter, G. V. Wimberly, W. F. Harris. Holdover directors are S. J. Shoemaker, M. E. Ritter, N. Fullerton, Guy Cordon, C. E. Wimberly, Dr. B. R. Shoemaker. Appraisers named by the association are W. F. Harris, G. V. Wimberly and M. E. Ritter. Guy Cordon is substitute appraiser. J. D. Wynne, N. Fullerton and Roy Agee were named as an auditing committee.

The association, it was announced, will distribute more than \$25,000 in dividends and reserves on July 1. The directors recently authorized a 4 per cent dividend. The association, since its organization in 1917, has never paid less than 4 per cent. It makes loans on improved real estate on the monthly repayment plan and has assets in excess of \$600,000. It now has available for loan on residence property approximately \$200,000. About \$75,000 was loaned on Roseburg property during the past year. 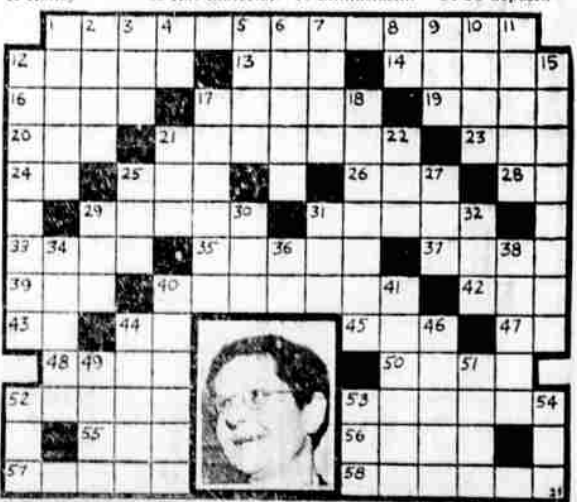

Western Union To Increase Roseburg Agency Service
