Record-Breaking Appropriation For Farm Aid Pending

WASHINGTON, June 25.—(AP)—A record-breaking \$1,060,000,000 farm bill to aid the 30,000,000 persons engaged in agriculture today awaited final congressional action in the senate.

Coupled with the recently enacted mandatory government crop loans act, intended to peg prices of major crops, the bulky appropriation bill was expected to give farmers their most prosperous year since the depression, and possibly since the world war era.

Senate leaders said they expected speedy approval—probably this week—for the measure which was hammered into final form after more than three months of legislative maneuvering.

In addition to the \$1,060,000,000 appropriated from the treasury, the measure also ordered \$270,000,000 in loans from the reconstruction finance corporation, and provided about \$20,000,000 of reappropriations and trust funds. In all, about \$1,350,000,000 will be available for the far flung agricultural programs.

Biggest single item was the usual \$500,000,000 for soil conservation payments to some 6,000,000 producers of cotton, wheat, corn, rice and tobacco who comply

with the administration farm program.

Next largest was \$212,000,000 for "parity payments" to these same farmers to bring their prices to a "parity level" or the same relative purchasing power these products had in the pre-war period of 1909-13.

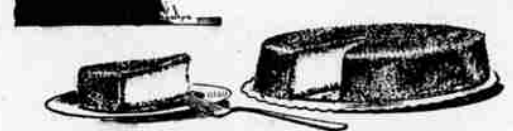

HER RECIPE

3 lbs. (4 c.) cottage cheese
1 c. heavy cream
1 1/2 c. White Sugar

2 tbsp. flour
1 tsp. vanilla extract
3 eggs, well-beaten
1 pkg. zwiebach

2 tbsp. melted butter
2 tbsp. cinnamon

Combine the cheese, cream 1 cup of the sugar, the flour, vanilla and the eggs, and beat well. Roll the zwiebach biscuits until fine (use 2 1/2 cup of crumbs), add the butter, cinnamon and the remaining 1/2 cup of White Sugar and mix well. Line a greased nine-inch spring pan with half this crumb mixture. Pour in the cottage cheese mixture and sprinkle with the remaining crumbs. Bake in a slow oven (325° F.) for 1 1/2 hrs.

Furniture Firms Get Request To Halt Price Rises

WASHINGTON, June 24.—(AP)—The office of price administration and civilian supply sent requests today to 47 of the largest manufacturers of furniture and to 16 producers of household refrigerators to halt price rises and cease other activities leading to inflation and economic "demoralization."

Leon Henderson, price administrator, asked the furniture makers to cease immediately the "open" method of quoting prices. A growing number of furniture manufacturers are refusing to quote firm prices, but instead are leaving the matter of prices open

until the time of shipment, Henderson's letter stated. He declared the practice would upset the market and seriously affect the general price level.

Later Henderson gave notice that he was considering placing a ceiling on prices of high speed tool steel scrap and other types of steel scrap having a high content of tungsten.

High speed steel is required to provide the cutting edge of machine tools and is essential in arms production. Tungsten is its most important ingredient.
