Nazis Claim Successes In Invasion of Russia

starved German public that the industrial city of Leningrad, second largest city in the U. S. S. R., had been the target of nazi bombers for two days. Rumanian

filers were said to have cooperated with German airmen in raids on Russian Black sea bases.

Finnish Port Blasted

Reports by way of Vichy said that German planes flying from the north, that is, Finland, had renewed assaults on Leningrad and the Russian naval base at Kronstadt. Up to this morning the Finnish port of Turku was said to have undergone 14 Russian bombing attacks. More than 100 buildings were destroyed there and other property was damaged.

(Turku would be a logical debarcation point for German troops sent to Finland.)

Casualties were impossible to estimate.

Another important sidelight on the nazi-Russian conflict came from the perplexed Japanese, who announced through their cabinet information bureau spokesman that Japan would be placed in "a very awkward and embarrassing position" by U. S. war aid to the soviet union.

He acknowledged that Japan had no clear knowledge as to the extent of any such aid.

Munitions Dump Razed

The British radio quoted a free Dutch newspaper today as saying a German munitions dump had been blown up at Amersfoort, in central Holland, and more than 100 terrific explosions shattered windows and roofs as far away as six miles.

"The dump was filled with heavy bombs for the luftwaffe," the radio said in the broadcast, heard here by CBS.

Stefani, official Italian news agency, reported from Budapest today a heavy explosion, believed to have been in a munitions dump, was felt throughout the Hungarian capital this morning.

War Blows Elsewhere.

Germany, now fighting on two big air fronts, said the luftwaffe last night sank 18,000 tons of British shipping and bombed objectives along the south coast of England.

Destruction of five British merchantmen, totaling 31,500 tons, was credited by Germany today to one submarine in recent operations in mid-Atlantic, west of Africa.

Pravda, Moscow organ of the communist party, paid high tribute to the British offensive on German's western air front, saying that more than 2,000 planes had been lost there.

The latest operation of the RAF, after a night of renewed hammering at Kiel, Cologne and Duesseldorf, was a one-hour attack by daylight on the German

occupied French coast. That has become the pattern of the RAF's campaign—deep inland by night, the coastal regions by day.

The German claim was that the British had lost 136 planes in the last eight days of cross-channel raiding.

Vichy to Give Up Syria.

Another salient development of the war was an authoritative report from a high Ankara source that Turkey had granted transit to Vichy forces from Syria provided they traveled as unarmed civilians.

Only a fraction of the French forces, however, were likely to get out because of transport limitations.

North and northwest of captured Damascus, the Syrian capital, the allies reported they had "increased the extent of their penetration."

It might well be that the Vichy mandate administration, seeing little chance of German help, now that the reich is tied up on the Russian front, was preparing to abandon Syria and Lebanon without another major battle.

At least 20,000-ton axis merchant ships have been torpedoed by British planes off the Italian coast, the RAF's middle east command at Cairo reported today.

Planes of the RAF and the fleet air arm attacked a convoy of several vessels yesterday off the south coast of Italy, the communiqué said.

Boats Made In U. S. Aid Britain In Seas Control

LONDON, June 27.—(AP)—With the aid of increasing numbers of mass-produced Corvette patrol boats and American-made Catalina flying boats, Britain slowly is winning "one of the war's most decisive battles—in the Atlantic ocean," it was declared here today.

Extended American naval patrols have aided the British, but a source here said the real credit for reducing British tonnage losses goes to the Catalina planes and sturdy Corvettes because they now are scouting sea areas the Germans formerly considered safe for submarine operations.

One result of what were called "unspectacular but emphatic triumphs" has been to force the Germans to forego their tactics of submarine rendezvous in mid-Atlantic with supply ships, it was asserted.

"Scouting flights have driven the U-boats below the surface," this source said. "They no longer are able to hunt in packs and lie in wait on the surface for convoys."

Another function of the Catalinas has been to keep German long-range bombers away from convoys because these Catalina boats give them a fierce fight and are said to be death on German Dornier "flying pencils."

The Corvettes have borne the main blows in the Atlantic battle. These craft look like a whaler but carry guns enough to down a destroyer and depth charges sufficient to destroy a flotilla of submarines. They have been turned out steadily since July, 1940.

GRANTS PASS, Ore., June 27.—(AP)—Elmer Hubbell, 24, Cottage Grove Pacific highway construction truck driver, was instantly killed Thursday night at Mt. Sexton when the bed of his dump truck crushed his head.

Coroner Hull said the dumped had been raised in a garage for inspection. Hubbell apparently released the oil pressure, he said, and the steel box fell on him.

Mrs. Rose was a resident of Roseburg for many years and was engaged as a teacher in Douglas county schools for a long period of time. In recent years she had restored the old family home in Tennessee and made her residence there.

PRICE BOOST JUSTIFIED CHRYSLER CORP. HOLDS

DETROIT, June 27.—(AP)—Defending its recent increase in retail automobile prices, Chrysler corporation issued a statement yesterday asserting that the advances had added only \$26.62 per car to its net income while recent increases in labor, materials, tools, supplies and other items had increased the cost of production by about \$27.55 per car.

The statement was issued in reply to a charge by Leon Henderson, federal price control administrator, that in declining to withdraw the price advance, Chrysler corporation had refused to cooperate with the office of administration and civilian supply.

"The Chrysler statement emphasized the corporation's participation in the defense program as evidence of its corporation with the government, and asserted that 'this incident will in no way affect our continued effort to cooperate... with all government agencies engaged in promoting national defense.'"

The Packard prior increase, according to M. M. Gilman, president of the company, was made with the approval of Henderson.

six or eight months or a year.

"As a general thing," he was asked, "are you satisfied with the management of the defense effort?"

On some things yes on some things no he responded. By inquiring in turn how he should know Mr. Roosevelt countered an inquiry whether the Irish were changing their views in the light of happenings in other parts of Europe.

He answered in the negative a question whether the United States ever had taken up the possibility of using Irish naval bases. And he added that he was quite sure the British never had said anything about seizing any bases from Ireland to help in the ferrying of war supplies across the Atlantic.

The only help definitely offered Ireland—and accepted—was the donation of \$500,000 in foodstuffs and the use of ships to carry them.

There were enough existing plants to make firearms, he said, but the country got behind on ammunition because more plants

to manufacture it had to be erected.

Advised that some columnist had said another \$5,000,000,000 lease-lend appropriation would be asked of congress in the near future, the chief executive re-

marked with a grin he supposed that would be true if the columnist lived long enough. But he said he did not know how long a life span would be required.
