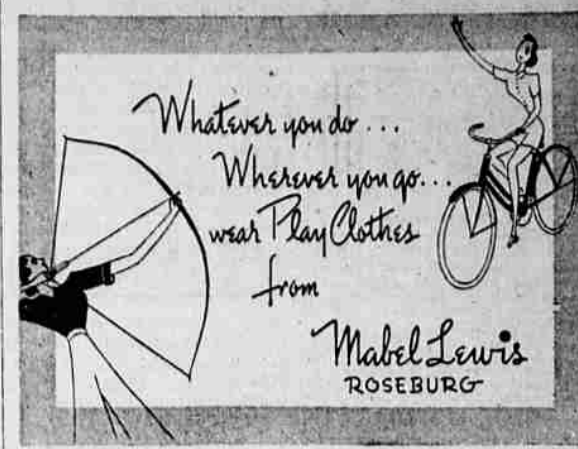
RUBY AND RUTH MATTHEWS HONORED AT CHARMING BIRTHDAY PARTY FRIDAY
