**Famous Blind Pianist Becomes U. S. Citizen**

CHICAGO, June 27. (AP)—Alec Templeton, 31, today became a citizen of a country he has never seen.

The blind pianist, noted for his performances on the radio and concert stage, swore allegiance to the United States with other new citizens in the courtroom of Federal Judge Igoe.

"It's a thrill," said Templeton. "Wherever I went in America the people were not only as great as their country but the friendliest I have ever met. This is where I belong and where I'm making my home."

Templeton came to the United States from Cardiff, South Wales, six years ago. A year ago he was married to Mrs. Juliette Valiani, a former concert singer.
