

Indians, Cardinals Regain Leads In Major Leagues

(By the Associated Press)

The Cleveland Indians and St. Louis Cardinals are out in front of the major leagues again.

The Indians came through last night with a 3-1 victory over the Chicago White Sox, as Milnar pitched a seven-hitter and his mates peppered Dietrich with timely hits.

Cleveland's triumph came on the heels of a 7-6 decision for the Philadelphia Athletics over the New York Yankees.

Joe DiMaggio extended his sensational batting streak to 39 consecutive games with his 17th home run and a single, and also increased the record home run string of the Yankees as a club to 36 in 22 straight contests.

Joe needed to hit again today at Philadelphia to have a chance to tie and break the 19-year-old, 41-game record of George Sisler Sunday at Washington, where the Yanks will play a double-header.

The Washington Senators whipped the Boston Red Sox, 5-3.

Harris pitched four-hit ball for the St. Louis Browns to shut out the Detroit Tigers, 9-0.

The Brooklyn Dodgers, who had ascended into a first-place tie in the National League Thursday while the St. Louis Cardinals were idle, had a day off themselves yesterday and the Red Birds gave them the same kind of treatment.

The Cardinals clipped the Cincinnati Reds, 5-3, and regained their half-game margin at the top of the standings.

The third-place New York Giants crushed the pitiful Phillies, 7-4, and sent the cellar dwellers to their 16th defeat in 18 games.

Sewell hurled six-hit ball for the Pittsburgh Pirates at Chicago, but had a narrow escape as the Pirates went to the ninth inning before getting him the margin of a 4-2 victory.

annihilated in the Luck—not the Minsk—sector.

There was a great, continuing battle between Luck and Lwow, which lie south of Minsk, separated from the Minsk section by the Pinski marshes.

The Russian high command claimed two other smashing victories: Annihilation of a German regiment in the Bessarabian sector and of "large detachments of enemy troops and the entire staff of the 39th panzer corps" in the Luck sector of Poland.

As to the southern front, the soviet officially declared that from Przemyśl in Poland down to the Black sea "our troops successfully repulsed numerous attempts by the enemy to penetrate our territory and firmly hold the state frontier."

DNB, official German news agency, in lieu of specific word from the high command, reported that Russia's 97th division had been broken up and destroyed.

Without saying what part of the line the division held, DNB added that hundreds of prisoners from one of its infantry regiments were from Turkestan and spoke hardly any Russian.

Warfare in Northland.

German troops were reported on the move through northern Finland from Norway to attack the soviet Arctic port of Murmansk while German planes attacked Russian objectives on the Kola peninsula fronting the Arctic sea. The red air force is believed to have underground hangars on the peninsula to protect Murmansk or carry air war westward.

A Helsinki report reaching London said that Finnish artillery at last had opened fire on the Russian defenses at Hanko, a naval base won from Finland by the short Russian-Finnish war of 1939-40. Hanko's batteries guard the entrance to the gulf of Finland whereon lie the Russian bases of Kronstadt and Leningrad.

Hanko was leased under the peace terms for 30 years but the Finns, now with German backing, would like to break the lease.

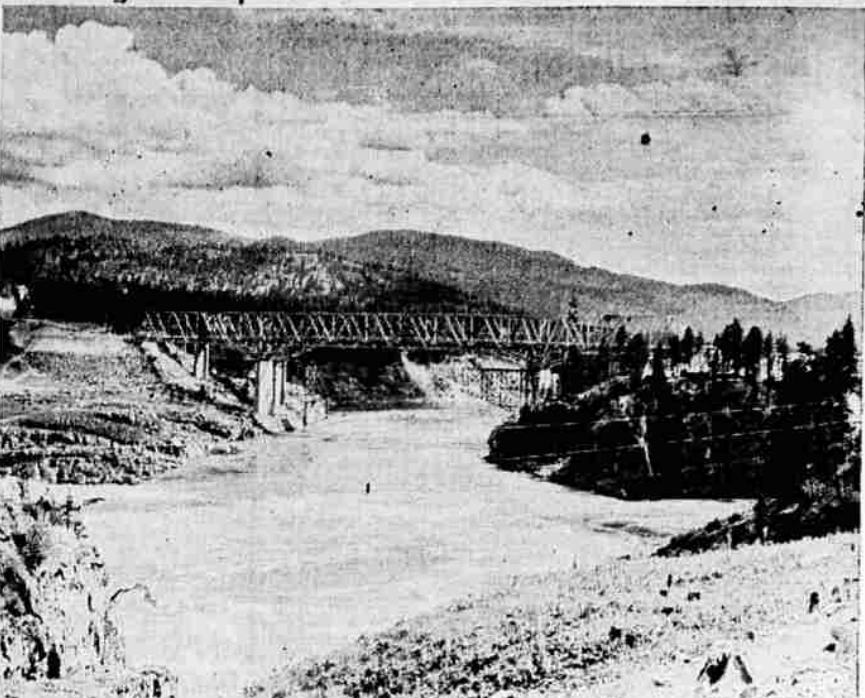
Dispatches direct from Helsinki said that Finnish forces, at the side of German divisions, were braced for defense against Russian forces officially estimated at more than 1,000,000 men along Finland's frontier from the gulf of Finland to the Arctic shore.

A Russian drive carrying the war into the far north and giving full active scope to the 2,000-mile front from the Arctic to the Black sea was expected in Helsinki to come any time.

U. S.-Axis Consular Swap Affects 500 Persons

WASHINGTON, June 27.—(AP)—The United States and the axis powers will exchange more than 500 unwanted consular officers, employees of official and other agencies, and their families with a round trip by an American vessel to sail from New York for Lisbon before July 15.

More than 300 German and Italian consular officials or employees and their families have been ordered by President Roosevelt to leave this country because of improper activities.

The American consuls and vice-consuls to return here include 37 from Germany, 17 from Italy, 10 from occupied France, six from Belgium, two from Greece, one from Luxembourg, six from The Netherlands, five from Norway and three from Yugoslavia.

Wm. Guggenheim of Noted Mining Dynasty Passes

NEW YORK, June 28.—(AP)—William Guggenheim, 72, youngest of seven brothers who pyramided a supposedly worthless mine into an industrial empire, died last night after an illness of several weeks.

Although he retired from the family firm 40 years ago to devote himself to philanthropic and patriotic enterprises, and wrote many booklets with patriotic themes, Guggenheim remained best known as one of America's copper kings.

Of the seven sons of Meyer Guggenheim, who made the name famous as the founder of the biggest mining dynasty, William was the best known with the possible exception of Simon, once a United States senator, and Daniel, donor of the fund for promotion of aeronautics.

to holders of defense bonds and life insurance policies and would frighten business men engaged in defense production.

Earlier, a joint senate-house conference committee broke up in disagreement over the \$935,005,000 relief bill, which must be enacted by Monday midnight unless the works projects administration is to be deprived of funds.

Crop Loan Fund Boosted

The senate approved today a \$1,250,000,000 increase in funds for price-pegging crop loans and a two-year extension for the government agency making them the commodity credit corporation.

Acting soon after its banking committee had reported the bill, the senate on a voice vote rushed the measure back to the house for consideration of two amendments.

The senate committee, working against a Monday deadline when the corporation was scheduled to expire, made two changes in legislation previously voted by the house.

It struck out a house-approved provision directing the secretary of agriculture to maintain prices at 85 per cent of parity for foods or crops, production of which was expanded to meet aid-defense demands.

It also reduced from five to four years the extension of the crop loan agency.

Mad Killer of Seattle May Be Suicide, Theory

SEATTLE, June 28.—(AP)—Organized civilian searchers will scour wooded areas in the north end tonight and tomorrow on the possibility the madman who killed Edward A. La Fountain Monday may have committed suicide because of remorse, Chief Criminal Deputy Sheriff Bodla said today.

Bodla and Detective Captain Scrafford still listed a missing north end mental patient as their main suspect in the shooting of La Fountain and the slaying of his wife and R. F. Bull. He is also sought for questioning about the rape-strangling Monday night of Mrs. Blanche Link, 43, that night.

Both Mrs. La Fountain and Bull, recovering, believe their assailant was either a north end resident or knew the area well.

Officer Kills Self on 33rd Service Anniversary

SEATTLE, June 28.—(AP)—Police colleagues reported yesterday that Sgt. Frank Olmstead shot and killed himself while seated in his automobile in front of the Catholic church of Our Lady of Good Help. He had been in ill health.

He was a brother of Roy Olmstead and Police Capt. Ralph Olmstead. He leaves a widow and a son.

Sergeant Olmstead joined the force 33 years ago yesterday. He would have been 60 next month.

methodically on schedule today. Royal air force bombers, sweeping across the channel, attacked a power station at Comines, near Lillie, authoritative sources said.

Preliminary reports said the target was bombed heavily and that all bombers had returned safely from the morning raid.

Pilots reported sighting only a few Nazi planes in their operations over France and said they shot down three of them. Three RAF fighter planes were reported missing but the pilot of one of these was reported safe.

In last night's widespread operations, the air ministry said, targets at Bremerhaven, Cuxhaven, Oldenburg, Den Helder, Dunkerque, Calais, in addition to the Vegesack, were attacked successfully and many direct hits were scored.

Nazi Prison Ship Seized

The 3,063-ton German vessel Alstertor, supply and prison ship for a Nazi sea raider, has been intercepted and survivors of two sunken British merchantmen

rescued, the admiralty announced today.

Seventy-eight officers and men were rescued, a communication said.

The admiralty also announced that a German raider sunk in the Indian ocean by the cruiser Cornwall, announced May 9, 1941, had a large number of mines aboard and that these mines were exploded by shells during the action, resulting in the death of a number of imprisoned British seamen.

NAZIS CLAIM TOP SCORE IN TOLL OF WARPLANES

BERLIN, June 28.—(AP)—Informed German sources today placed total British air losses in the preceding 24 hours at 36 planes, against one German, and reported the sinking of six merchantmen totaling 21,500 tons off the English southeast coast by Nazi airmen overnight.

In addition to the six vessels sunk, informed sources said, a 3,000-ton craft was badly damaged.

Slight damage to buildings was acknowledged in British bombing of places in western Germany.

Repeated RAF attempts to attack an airport near Calais yesterday were reported frustrated by the German defense and bombs were said to have been dropped aimlessly.

ROME, June 28.—(AP)—Italian artillery fire destroyed a British motorized column on the Tobruk front in north Africa, the fascist high command asserted today, while fierce fighting continued in the Galla Sidamo zone of western Ethiopia.

"In air combats over Malta," it reported, "our fighter planes shot down four British planes. Two of our planes failed to return to base."

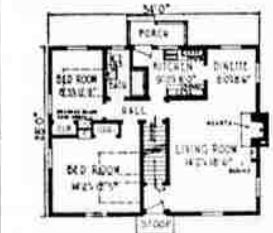

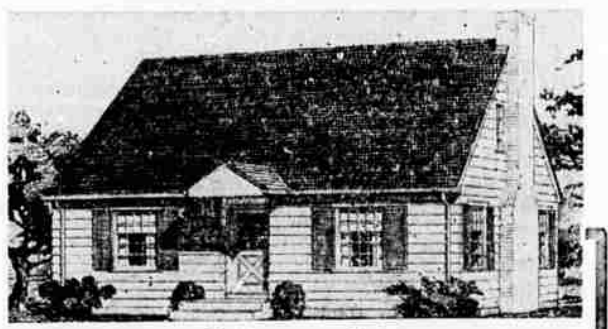
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
