NEW 21-ERS RELATED TO REGISTER TOMORROW

Enrolling In
Douglas Only
At RoseburgArmy's Plan Is to Call
Only 50,000 Monthly in
Nation for Training

The Douglas county selective service board was prepared today for registration Tuesday of the young men of the county who have reached the age of 21 years since last October 16. The registration will be conducted at the courthouse in Roseburg, and all registrants will be required to come to this city for the purpose. The board was unable to establish registration places elsewhere, due to the fact that no funds were provided for expenses.

Members of the board will be assisted by advisory board members in handling the registrations, expected to number from 100 to 110. The number is estimated by averaging the age groups for each year as shown by the previous registration.

The board will start its work at 7 a. m. continue acceptance of registrations until 9 p. m. Employers have been requested to give employees free time for the purpose of registration. Dr. Charles Edwards, chairman reports.

A total of 6,572 persons are expected to register in Oregon tomorrow, compared with 134,989 on October 16, last year, when every man from 21 to 36 years of age registered.

IN the war winds today (Friday) this straw appears:
Hitler is calling on continental Europe (composed of his slaves and his stooges) to rise in a holy war against communism.

SPAIN reports that he has DEMANDED a "token" anti-communist force from each nation of the Nazi-planned new Europe. A Spanish legion is being recruited in response to the demand.

Italy is sending a motorized division. Finland is going into the war against Russia. Rumania is already in. The Danes sever diplomatic relations with the Soviet. Volunteers are said to be offering themselves to the cause in The Netherlands, Belgium and Norway and Sweden is extending sympathy and material assistance.

In Berlin our familiar friend "authorized German spokesman" describes continental Europe as engaged in a "spontaneous uprising" against Soviet Russia.

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Paderewski, Poland's
First President, Wizard
Of Piano, Passes Away

Ignace Jan Paderewski

NEW YORK, June 30.—(AP)—Ignace Jan Paderewski, 80, who ruled a piano for 60 years and a nation for one, died last night.

Pneumonia struck down the first president of the Polish republic and one of the greatest musicians of all times after a two-day illness.

The white-haired patriot was stricken with a cold last week and, ignoring his doctor's orders, made one of his many recent public appearances to help raise funds for his starving countrymen.

Three days ago he became gravely ill and yesterday he was placed in an oxygen tent, only to breathe his last just before midnight.

Paderewski was probably the first world-famous musician in history to abandon his art at the height of his success, devote himself to liberating and unifying his country and then, his program balked by politics, returned to still greater international acclaim on the concert stage.

The masterful fingers of the spectacular virtuoso thrilled millions as they drew inspiring interpretations from the piano, but his greatest joy in life came when Poland was recreated an independent nation.

In the historic part which he took in that development, he spent his fortune of \$2,700,000. In later years, upon resuming his music, he explained he needed work to live. At the age of 75 he starred in a British movie.

From the time he resigned as premier of Poland on December 9, 1919, after less than a year in office, he kept aloof from politicians, but he never lost his ardent patriotism.

He retired in 1921 to a 2,600-acre ranch in Santa Barbara county, California, the remnants of an extensive holding of which the greater part had been sold to provide funds for Polish propaganda. It was from this home, which he finally sold in 1934, that he emerged to resume concert

work in 1923. Paderewski was twice married, the first time when he was only 19 to Antonina Kersak of Warsaw. She died a year later in giving birth to a crippled son who became the father's chief concern until his death several years later.

The second wife, whom he married in 1899, was Mme. Helena Gorska, daughter of Baron von Rosen, former Russian ambassador to the United States. By her first marriage she had a son, W. O. Gorski, who was director of the Polish information bureau and later became a resident of New York.

Ship Bearing U. S.
Marines Torpedoed

WASHINGTON, June 30.—(AP)—Torpedoing of a foreign-flag steamer carrying American marines and Red Cross nurses to London was announced today by the navy which said eight marines had been rescued, and, for the present, mentioned no loss of life.

The navy did not name the ship which an earlier authoritative source said was the Dutch steamer Maarsden, in the British service. The Red Cross said it had 17 nurses aboard the Maarsden and that all were reported safe, with six nurses already landed.

The source from which first information of the sinking was obtained had said 10 marines were aboard and that one was reported lost. If the figure 10 is correct, the navy announcement would indicate the loss of two marines.

Sumner Welles, acting secretary of state, said that American nurses were aboard the same vessel with the marines traveling to England to help the expanded services of the American embassy including communications and fire prevention.

29 Nabbed In
Record Spy
Suspect HuntFBI Chief Announces
"Fly-Trap" Haul of Ring
After 2 Years' Stalking

NEW YORK, June 30.—(AP)—Seven of the 29 persons arrested in the government's big week-end spy hunt pleaded guilty today to espionage against the United States. Innocent pleas were made by 18 others, including two technicians described as having been associated closely with the manufacture of secret army bombsights.

Twenty-five of the suspects were arraigned in Brooklyn federal court and were held for trial July 15 under bail totaling \$425,000.

Two suspects who pleaded innocent were Herman Lang, 40, German-born draftsman who was said to have worked since 1934 as a factory inspector of the Norden Bombsight, and Everett Minster Roeder, 47, New York City native reliably reported to have been a draftsman since 1927 at the Sperry gyroscopic plant in Brooklyn where the Sperry bombsights are made.

NEW YORK, June 30.—(AP)—Swiftly and secretly during the week-end the nation wound up its greatest spy suspect hunt in its history with the arrest of 29 men and three women on espionage charges.

Agents of the federal bureau of investigation entered homes and taverns in four states to seize 24 suspects, FBI Chief J. Edgar Hoover announced yesterday, while five others already were in custody on other charges.

CCC Transfers
Affect Unit At
S. Umpqua Falls

TILLER, Ore., June 29.—(Special.)—CCC Company 2904, which has occupied Camp South Umpqua Falls since the camp was opened on July 22, 1935, will be disbanded on July 7, a radiogram received at the camp by acting Company Commander Clarence F. Craw today revealed. Disbandment of the company is due to the low company strength and the policy of the war department of combining small personnel camps.

Company 2904 is the lone remaining Oregon company in the district and, with its disbandment and the removal of the 25 members to Camp Reedsport in the Vancouver barracks district, the Medford district is stripped of any camps manned by Oregon men.

Disbandment orders received later in the day also directed the disbandment of Companies 920 at Camp Orleans, California, and Co. 3442 at Camp Hart Mountain, east of Lakeview. The company at Camp Orleans was the last California company in the district, and disbandment of these two ninth corps companies leaves the Medford district manned entirely by boys from the southern states, comprising the fourth corps area.

Orders for the disbandment of the present South Umpqua Falls company also included the transfers of Company 5478, now located at Camp Gasquet, near Crescent City, California, to the South Umpqua camp on July 7 to replace Company 2904. In all, the orders involved the disbandment of three companies and the moving of three others within the Medford district, the other two being involved in movement between Company 6412 at Camp Leaf, California, to Camp Orleans, and Company 6451 from Camp Seiad, California, to Camp Beaver Creek, California, in the Sacramento district.

A resolution urging the temporary closing of the WPA, and the striking from the list of any relief client refusing to accept offered employment, was submitted here today by the directors of the Douglas County Taxpayers league.

The resolution, directed to the Works Progress Administration, declares that there is a serious shortage of farm labor in Douglas county and that assistance must be obtained by farmers if crops are to be saved. There is no need of continuance of the WPA until after the close of harvest, the tax league directors assert. They propose that all workers be released to help save crops, and that such workers be permitted to retain their relief status without reclassification.

The league directors held their meeting at the Umpqua hotel Saturday, with members present from all parts of Douglas county.

W. A. Burdick, of Reedsport, chairman of the school district committee, was appointed to investigate a proposal that all school supplies be purchased through a central agency. He will

Apparent Victor
For Senator In
Texas Election

Lyndon Johnson

DALLAS, Tex., June 30.—(AP)—It seemed today only a miracle could save "Miracle-Man" W. Lee O'Daniel from his first election defeat. A 32-year-old friend of the president, Lyndon Johnson, was all but elected Texas' next U. S. senator.

As counting of Saturday's ballots was resumed this morning, Rep. Johnson, who campaigned on a "Roosevelt and unity" platform, had a lead of 4,561 ballots over the 51-year-old O'Daniel who twice became Texas' governor to the tune of hill-billy music, homey poetry and a smooth radio voice.

Totals of the four major candidates when the Texas election bureau shut down at 9 last night with 116 out of 254 counties complete, and about 96 per cent of the vote in were: Johnson 167,471; O'Daniel 162,910; Attorney General Gerald C. Mann 135,075, and Rep. Martin Dies 77,382. The election bureau estimated between 15,000 and 18,000 votes still out.

Two Cities Taken in Lunge
Toward Moscow; Tank Units
Battling in Ukraine Region

German panzer columns, following the Napoleonic road to Moscow, were reported to have smashed through Russia's red army defenses approximately half way to the Soviet capital today.

The German high command said the sweep of the 9-day-old Nazi onslaught had already captured Lwow, in former Poland, and a Berlin spokesman reported the fall of Minsk, 20 miles inside the old frontier of the U. S. S. R.

The Nazi spokesman indicated that Adolf Hitler's invasion forces already were in sight of Smolensk, 200 miles east of Minsk on the highway to Moscow.

The spokesman said a big pocket was being formed around Russian troops in the Smolensk region, while a special German war bulletin declared that "on the north wing we are in constant pursuit."

Machinists Back
On Shipyard Jobs

Machinists who had been on strike since May 10 headed back to work today on \$500,000,000 of defense production in 11 shipyards and drydocks of the San Francisco bay area.

All will work under a coast-wide master contract, covering all shipyards, which provides payment of \$1.12 an hour and pay and a half for overtime. The strikers had asked for \$1.15 and double overtime pay. While working they will continue negotiations on their demands.

A breakdown of negotiations for a new contract led to a strike call yesterday by AFL's United Automobile workers in the wire division of the Electric Auto Light corporation, Port Huron, Mich., which has orders from the navy for electrical supplies.

The union wants a raise of 10 cents an hour for all employees, a union preferential clause or union shop agreement, and a 5 per cent premium on the base wage for night workers. The present basic rate of pay for the plant's 650 employees was not disclosed.

Aid Democracies, Don't
Send Troops, Hoover Says

CHICAGO, June 30.—(AP)—Herbert Hoover's seven-point program for America proposes, among other things, a prepared nation, remaining at peace and giving every aid to Britain and China without putting American troops in the war zones.

In a radio broadcast last night the former president asserted that a prepared America need not fear military disaster but that the nation's only defeat would be "if we lost our own national freedom and our potency for good in the world."

Hoover described his program as a course for "reasoning people which avoids the most destructive forces and holds fast to the most constructive forces." That program, he added, was "neither defeatist, nor isolationist, nor interventionist."

License Year Starts In
Oregon for Some Groups

Several licenses issued by the foods and dairies division of the state department of agriculture will expire on June 30, including those for cheese makers, butter makers, garbage feeders and rendering plant operators.

Under the 1941 rendering plant law, a license of \$50 for each such plant will be collected and \$10 for each holding plant and \$10 for each individual operating separately from a rendering plant but handling carcasses or parts of animals for a rendering plant owned by another.

Seven Perct. Tax on New
Auto Sales Favored

WASHINGTON, June 30.—(AP)—Members said the house ways and means committee agreed tentatively today to recommend a 7 per cent tax on the sale price of new automobiles, which would produce about \$79,900,000 of new revenue, instead of the 15 per cent levy proposed by the treasury.

Once again the implication was that Russia's resistance was crumbling under the impact of Hitler's lightning tactics, executed by a force which the Russians themselves estimated at more than 2,500,000 troops—presumably including Germany's allies, the Finns, Slovaks, Rumanians and Hungarians.

Nazi reports also asserted that German troops had encircled a Soviet division—about 15,000 men—near the Baltic coast in a renewed push northward through Lithuania and Latvia.

The German high command further reported the capture of Libau, on the Baltic sea.

DNB, the official German news agency, declared the ring around the red army division in the Baltic was "so narrow and tight that destruction of the bolshevik units is certain."

DNB said several hundred Soviet tanks and 42 cannon were captured or destroyed at Rawa Ruska, 40 miles northwest of Lwow.

What Russians Claim

"During last night, our troops continued stubborn fighting in the Murmansk, Dvinsk, Minsk and Luch sectors," a Russian communique said.

"In other sectors of the front, reconnaissance, frequent troop regrouping and artillery duels took place."

While the Germans claimed a rapid-fire series of successes, it was apparent that with the exception of the Minsk area, Russia's red armies still were fighting west of the 1939 Soviet frontiers.

In addition, a Moscow communique declared that German attempts to knife across the Karelian Isthmus from Finland, now fighting at the side of Germany, and to land troops by sea at Viipuri were repulsed.

Viipuri is on the Gulf of Finland, only 74 miles by railroad from Leningrad, Russia's second largest city.

The Soviet war bulletin also asserted that the red army still was holding against violent attacks ranging from Murmansk, on the Barents sea, to the vicinity of Minsk and on south through the Luch-Lwow gateway to the great wheatfields of the Ukraine.

Tanks in Terrific Battle

In this region, between Luck and Lwow, a flaming battle of 4,000 German and Soviet tanks raged into its fifth day with the Nazi juggernaut seeking to break through to the Ukraine capital of Kiev.

RAF Continues
Damaging Raids

LONDON, June 30.—(AP)—British RAF bombers resumed operations against French bases across the English channel to night, raiding the French coast between Boulogne and Calais for more than half an hour. This followed a daring daylight raid this morning on the docks of Bremen and railway yards south of Oldenburg, it was authoritatively reported.

The bombers utilized clouds over northwest Germany. It was said, to screen the attack that followed raids last night which were declared to have started "very large fires" and caused great damage at Hamburg and Bremen.

RAF bombers set afire and are believed to have sunk two German ships of 6,000 and 3,000 tons, of the Dutch coast today, it was reported by the British.
