

Joe DiMaggio Sets Batting Record In Major Baseball

Yank Outfielder Hits Safely In 42 Consecutive Games; Breaking 19-Year-Old Mark

(By the Associated Press) From today on it is Joe DiMaggio who must sit and watch nervously as one slugging youngster after another comes up to challenge his modern big-league record for hitting in consecutive games.

The long watch ended yesterday for George Sisler, the once-petted first baseman of the St. Louis Browns, as he saw his record of hitting in 41 straight contests shattered after 19 years by the New York Yankee star in an exhibition in the nations' capital.

Joe, the new king, slammed a double in the first contest against the Senators to tie Sisler's record and then came through with a widely-applauded single in the seventh inning of the nightcap to stamp his name in the record book. Since May 15 DiMaggio has not been blanked, and in that period he has blazed away at a .377 clip to help drive the Yankees into leadership of the American league.

Perhaps inspired by DiMaggio's clouting, the Yankees are in the midst of one of the greatest streaks of sustained hitting ever recorded. In scoring yesterday's twin killing of the Senators 9 to 4 and 7 to 5, they ran the number of consecutive contests in which they had hit at least one home run to 25. Today they held a game and a half lead over the Cleveland Indians, who were throttled by veteran Ted Lyons of the Chicago White Sox, 9 to 3.

The Boston Red Sox divided a double bill with the Athletics. Cronin hit a home run with the bags filled to spark a 13 to 1 victory in the opener, but Knott stopped them in the nightcap, 3 to 2, on seven hits.

Detroit broke a four-game losing streak when Newhouser set the St. Louis Browns down on four hits, 3 to 1.

The two National league battlers, St. Louis and Brooklyn, fought to a draw as each divided a double-header, the Cardinals retaining their one-game lead.

Walters of Cincinnati outpitched Warneke and two other St. Louis flingers to win yesterday's first encounter 6 to 2, but the Cards came roaring back to slug out a 14-to-4 win over five Red throwers in the second.

Brooklyn gained a split with the Boston Braves, winning 5 to 2 and then losing 6 to 2 in the nightcap.

The Pittsburgh Pirates thumped the Chicago Cubs twice, 8 to 2 and 3 to 2, thereby vaulting nimbly into fifth place in the National.

The Giants tightened their hold on the third rung by biffing the unfortunate Phillies, 10 to 7.

Debernardi Hurts O-Hit, O-Run Game To Defeat Hamer's

Douglas Legion Juniors Take First Half of Twin Bill, 5-0, But Lost Second, 6 to 3

By "HAP" APPLIGATE A seven-inning no-hit, no-run game was pitched here Sunday by Dick Debernardi, ace hurler of the Douglas County Legion Juniors, as the local Legion team defeated Hamer's All-Stars of Eugene, 5 to 0, in the first game of a double-header. The Eugene squad, composed principally of players from Legion teams of the last two years, won the second contest 6 to 3.

In the first game, Debernardi struck out eight Eugene batters and did not allow a ball to be hit out of the infield. Only three players reached first base, all on walks. The only threat of the game was in the fifth frame, when D. Plath walked, stole second and went to third on a passed ball, but died on base as Debernardi fanned two batters.

Hamer, Eugene pitcher, allowed only three hits, but wildness and four errors accounted for the five Roseburg tallies.

The second game produced good pitching for both teams, with Norman Main steaming in his fast ball for the Roseburg team, while Frye showed much strength in the pinches.

Roseburg started the scoring with two tallies in the first inning, when, with two down and the bases loaded, Rust doubled to left field. Eugene tied the score in the second on a walk, error and a triple by Emmons, who secured the first Eugene hit for the day.

The Juniors went into a 3 to 2 lead in the third when Cummings walked and scored on a double by Cox. After going scoreless in the

third Eugene, ganged on the locals for three runs in the fourth on a walk, hit batter, an error and a single. The final tally came in the fifth when Ace Plath singled and scored on a hit by Frye.

Hurlers Show Mastery
 Frye struck out nine batters, and walked three, while Main whiffed eight and walked four. Each pitcher allowed four hits.

An interesting feature of Sunday's games was that both teams combined, in 14 innings, secured only 11 hits. Cox of Roseburg was the only player with two hits, both coming in the second game.

The Juniors open their conference season next Sunday afternoon at Medford when they play a double header against the Medford Juniors, who broke even Sunday in a double header with Marshfield.

Coach Howard Parks expressed satisfaction with the Roseburg team in all departments except hitting and will stress that point in practices this week.
