about halfway to Moscow—did not comprise an army of occupation but rather a raiding column whose presence "without doubt soon will prove most uncomfortable to the enemy."

This contingent on wheels, it was pointed out, has outstripped Napoleon's march on Moscow by nearly six weeks. Over the same route covered by the Nazi spearhead in little more than a week, Napoleon launched his ill-fated drive on Moscow June 24, 1812.

Conscripted men and women of Leningrad labored to fortify Russia's second city, menaced from the Finnish front and by a Nazi drive through the Baltic states.

France's off-stage role in the 19-day-old struggle moved nearer the actual fighting with a statement by the Vichy French government that it had "no objection" to French volunteers fighting alongside their former enemies, the Germans.

Only yesterday France broke off diplomatic relations with Russia.

Rome radio said Chancellor Hitler and Premier Mussolini decided on "the war against Moscow and the destruction of the red army" at their latest Brenner pass meeting, June 2.

In Washington, D. C., acting Secretary of State Welles disclosed that Russia has now made its first overtures to obtain sup-

plies from the United States.

Welles said the Soviet ambassador talked with him yesterday on the subject of placing orders for materials to aid Russia in combatting the Nazi invasion.

BRITISH RAID TRIPOLI: ITALIAN GENERALS BAGGED

CAIRO, Egypt, July 1.—(AP)—A series of punishing RAF raids on Tripoli, capital and chief port of Italian Libya, in which several vessels in the harbor were severely hit was reported today by the RAF's middle east command.

British planes later machine-gunned disembarked troops at Tripoli and axis planes on the water there, causing damage and many casualties, the daily communique said.

The RAF also reported shooting seven German planes and damaging several others in a battle which originated when the axis air force attempted several attacks on a British convoy off the Libyan coast.

Three Italian generals and

more than 3,000 other officers and men surrendered to the British when Ghimbi, in southwest Ethiopia, capitulated June 27, the British middle east command announced today.

ROME, July 1.—(AP)—The Italian high command reported today the sinking of two British destroyers, one off Bardia, Libya, and the other in the eastern Mediterranean.

A third destroyer, in a British squadron attacked by axis bombers off Bardia, was "seriously damaged," a communique said.

The Italians said they still were holding out against British pressure at Debra Tabor, Ethiopia.

NEW YORK, July 1.—(AP)—The fast French motorship passenger liner Oregon, well-known in the pre-war Pacific coast-French trade, has been captured by British warships in the south Atlantic in a continuing series of hostilities between the former allies, maritime circles said today.

Capture by the British of two French trawlers also was disclosed.

Requested Excise Taxes Reach Into Many Places

led on every privately-owned automobile.

Another committee recommendation likely to affect a broad section of the population was that a five per cent tax be imposed on all passenger transportation fares over 35 cents, whether by rail, water, air or bus.

The yield from the new excise levies, plus returns from increases previously recommended in individual income, corporation, excess profits, estate and gift taxes, would account for approximately \$3,315,000,000 of the revenue sought.

Soft Drink Levy Studied

As one means of raising the remaining money, the committee today looked for a way to tax soft drinks without increasing their retail prices.

The treasury proposed that such beverages be taxed one-cent-a-bottle but some legislators said that in states which already had tried similar levies, it was found that they seriously impaired the sale of the products.

"What we are trying to do," one member said, "is to tax soft drinks as much as possible without forcing the retailer to increase his price. Whether we can do this by taxing the syrups that go into the drinks is what we've got to decide."

The treasury estimated that the one-cent tax would yield about \$132,500,000 additional.

Apart from the use tax on automobiles, yachts and airplanes, the committee tentatively recommended a seven per cent excise tax on the sale price of new automobiles which the treasury estimated would produce about \$79,900,000. It was contended the tax also would help to reduce competition for the decreased output of pleasure cars and thus help offset inflationary effects of the defense spending program.

Billions More Voted

Congressional clerks today speeded to the president for signature more than \$4,000,000,000 in appropriations, the product of the last strenuous session of the old fiscal year which ended at midnight.

Teamwork between the two houses cleared not only the key spending bills but also legislation expanding and continuing the commodity credit corporation.

The day's work brought close to \$40,000,000,000 the record-breaking total of congressional appropriations and spending authorizations voted thus far this session.

The principal measures dispatched to President Roosevelt during the lengthy day were: The \$910,905,000 relief bill; the \$1,660,000,000 farm measure, including funds for "parity payments" to farmers; the \$1,195,861,940 supply bill for the labor department and the security agency; the \$1,030,000,000 deficiency bill, providing more than \$400,000,000 for 2,236 new naval planes; the \$54,183,106 supply bill for the District of Columbia.
