Hollies Continue Winning Streak

Hollywood, after stumbling around in the coast league's second division all season, looks like a surprise contender for a pay-dirt finish.

A live-run barrage in the tenth inning gave the Stars a 6 to 1 victory over San Francisco last night, and continued the winning streak that humbled league-leading Sacramento last week five games out of seven.

The win jumped the Stars into a virtual tie with the Seals and Los Angeles for fourth place. Only a hairs' breadth separates the three teams in percentage points.

San Diego reshuffled positions again with Seattle, going back into second place by nipping the Rainiers 3 to 2. The Padres were badly out-hit, but overcame a one-run deficit in the ninth inning when Mazzera homered and scored Haslin.

Sacramento recovered some of its lost ground by manhandling cellarite Portland in both games of a double-header. The Solons won the opener 3 to 0, with Guttridge driving in all three runs and the nightcap 8 to 1.

Oakland's victory started Acorns glutting themselves on hits in smashing Los Angeles, 14 to 3. The Oaks pounded out 17 safe blows off three Angel hurlers.

Lemos Kayos Scalzo to Win Featherweight Title

LOS ANGELES, July 2. (AP)—Little Mexico, after years of dreams and wasted hope, has a world champion fighter.

Richard Lemos, born within the shadow of the old mission in the heart of Los Angeles, won the National Boxing association featherweight title last night with a spectacular five-round knockout over Peter Scalzo of New York. For four rounds the two fought on even terms. Then, as the fifth started, Lemos, something of an oddity because he is a switch-hitter, shifted to southpaw style and proceeded to wreck the game little easterner. After the second knockdown, Scalzo couldn't rise.

DiMaggio Ties Top Hit Mark; Yankees Boost League Lead

The Yankee streak that you probably haven't heard anything about is a five-game winning streak—and it may turn out to be more important than Joe DiMaggio's sensational string of hits or the club's chain of home runs.

The New York bombers are raiding the strong and the weak alike these days. Their double victory, 7-2 and 9-2, over the rugged Boston Red Sox yesterday gave them a record of nine wins in their past 10 games and increased their American league lead in spite of the fact that the Cleveland Indians won last night at St. Louis.

DiMaggio made two hits in the opener and one in the five-inning nightcap to tie Willie Keeler's all-time major league record of hitting in 44 consecutive contests in 1897, when fouls didn't count as strikes.

The Yankees' record streak of 40 home runs in 25 straight tilts ended in the first game. Until yesterday the Yanks hadn't missed hitting a home run since the second half of a double-header June 1 in Cleveland. They passed Detroit's 17-game record a week ago Sunday.

Indians' Punch Revived.
The Indians have been showing some of their expected doldrums and last night Manager Peckinpaugh fined and suspended Roy Weatherly, one of the league's best centerfielders, for not hustling.

The Tribe tore into the St. Louis Browns for a 10-6 triumph, with Trosky and Pitcher Milner

hitting home runs and Heath having a perfect turn at bat with four hits. But even so the Yankee margin was stepped up to 23 games.

The Philadelphia Athletics whipped the Washington Senators, 10-1, with a 16-hit offensive and four-hit hurling by Marchildon, who had a no-hitter in his grasp until the eighth inning.

Detroit downed the Chicago White Sox, 5-1, with Trout pitching three-hit ball and not allowing a run after the first.

The St. Louis Cardinals gained exclusive possession of first place in the National league again by plastering an 11-7 defeat on the Pittsburgh Pirates with a 17-hit assault led by Mize and Hopp, each with four hits. Mize batted in five runs, three on a homer in the third inning.

The Brooklyn Dodgers dropped a 6-4 decision to the Phillies.

The downtrodden Boston Braves came through with a 6-4 victory over the New York Giants in the only other National league game.
