

Time Limit Put On One-Party Camps At Diamond Lake

Camping in the improved lakeshore camp spots at Diamond lake will be limited to 15 days for any one party. This limitation is being placed into effect by V. V. Harpham, supervisor of the Umpqua national forest in accordance with authority of regulation U-5 issued by the secretary of agriculture. The forest service regrets that it becomes necessary to put this regulation into effect, Mr. Harpham states, but it appears unavoidable in order to prevent a few people from utilizing the best lakeshore camp spots for several months at a time and thus working a hardship on the occasional camper, who has only a few days or a week to spend at the lake. The improvements at Diamond lake were built to take care of 30,000 visitors per year, whereas visitors now actually number more than 100,000 per season, the supervisor reports.

"The 15-day camping limitation is placed only on the improved lakeshore spots. Other camp spots at the lake are open for longer periods. There is never a charge made for camping at Diamond lake nor in any other forest service developed campground," Mr. Harpham states, "so in order that the forest service policy of making the recreational resources of the forest serve the greatest number of people in the most consistent way, it becomes necessary in certain congested areas to apply limited restrictions in order to be fair to all concerned."

Friday midget racing, at approximately 9:15 p. m. All events will be staged at the Lane county fairgrounds.

Olympia Auto Dealer Believed Drowned

OLYMPIA, July 2.—(AP)—Waters of Budd's inlet were being searched today for the body of Homer L. Wolf, Jr., Olympia automobile dealer, believed to have been drowned sometime during the night, police reported.

Wolf is believed to have fallen into the water during a trip from

the Olympia Yacht club to the Country and Golf club dock, where his wife waited for him until after midnight.

Police said that Wolf apparently attempted to tow his launch with the dinghy after motor trouble developed. The larger boat was found off the log booms beyond the port dock, the dinghy alongside with the anchor and rope fastened as though for towing. The hood to the motor compartment of the small cruiser was open, police said, indicating motor trouble had developed.
