

U. S. Fliers Aid RAF In Raid on Germans

Into the afternoon without let-up, observers said the RAF apparently was sending increasingly large numbers of planes into the aerial offensive.

Besides Brest, the air ministry said docks at Cherbourg also were bombed in the overnight raids which cost the British two planes.

Both the Scharnhorst and Gneisenau, 26,000-ton German battleships, have been reported by the British in Brest and straddled several times by British raiding planes.

These recently were joined, according to British reports by a 10,000-ton cruiser, presumably the Prinz Eugen, which the British said was heavily damaged in the sea battle in which her raiding partner, the 35,000-ton German battleship Bismarck, was sunk. Shakedown Surprises Britons.

General Sir Archibald P. Wavell suddenly was transferred today from the middle east to India, and surprised Britons speculated on the possibility that the government foresaw a quick German victory over soviet Russia and a subsequent Nazi drive on the Ganges.

The transfer, in fact, was a switch of commands. Gen. Sir Claude Auchinleck, 57-year-old Scot, moving from India to the middle east.

Prime Minister Churchill today refused to make a statement which might explain the reason for the change.

Wavell was the target for considerable Australian criticism after the Greek campaign, and

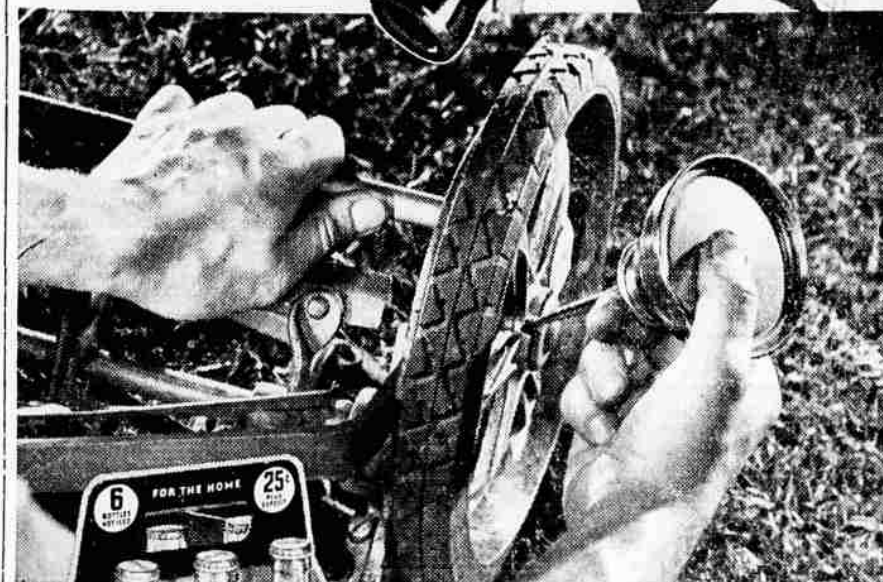

from Australian sources in London today it was learned that the resentment of Prime Minister Menzies was an important contributory factor to Wavell's shift.

Australian staff officers, these sources said, advised Wavell against his defensive dispositions after his army overran Crenaca. Wavell was reported to have replied that 300 miles of desert between his army and axis troops in Tripoli would hold any enemy advance to small units.

The same sources said that as a result of holding this view the western defenses of Crenaca were reduced to send troops to Greece and that when the Germans hit the British screen and penetrated they swept the British out of positions and won territory the taking of which had "cost hundreds of Australian lives."

Some sections of the press, most friendly to the government, saw Wavell's removal as a promotion in view of the supposed German threat to India, but few neutral observers believe the threat as serious as portrayed even if Germany invests the Ukraine.

Staggering Blow Dealt Russians, Germans Claim

suffering heavy casualties under the strafing of the Nazi Luftwaffe, while German and Finnish armies rolled across the U. S. S. R. from Finland in a new drive toward Leningrad, Russia's second biggest city.

A German war bulletin asserted the red armies were falling back east of Lwow, in former Poland, and east of German-captured Minsk, the capital of white Russia, and were retreating toward Estonia.

"Units of the Hungarian army advancing from the Carpathian passes into Galicia joined the German army on schedule," the Nazi communiqué said.

What Russia Claimed
Before this German claim, the U. S. S. R. reported it had stopped the fierce Nazi drives aimed

at Moscow and Leningrad and had annihilated advance German tank forces on the central front.

In the south, a soviet war bulletin said, other heavy blows were struck at German forces driving into the Luck area, gateway to the Ukraine treasure-house of wheat, coal and iron.

In the north, above the Arctic circle, the Russians reported that soviet troops were putting up "fierce resistance" against a German offensive on the Sredni peninsula, at the north entrance to the ice-free port of Murmansk.

London radio quoted a German-controlled Norwegian broadcast as saying that the Russian base at Vipur, on the Karelian isthmus, has been surrounded by Finnish soldiers landed behind the base.

Six Russian planes were shot down yesterday by Finnish fighters and anti-aircraft guns, said an official announcement at Helsinki today.

The government also reported that Kotka, on the southern coast 90 miles east of Helsinki, was raided yesterday by Russian planes which machine-gunned civilians. Raids on three other towns with only minor damage were reported.

Soviet warplanes were pictured as inflicting great damage on Nazi tank columns and strafing German infantry "masses" plodding into the one-time land of the Tsars.

On the south end of the 2,000-mile battlefield, along the Brat river sector, the Russians reported that "all attempts by Rumanian and German troops to penetrate into Bessarabian territory" were being routed.

Radio Tass reported today from Moscow that four German submarines had been sunk in three days by soviet warships in the Baltic sea.
