

U. S. Funds Outgo Far Over Income

WASHINGTON, July 2.—(AP)—The Treasury announced today it spent \$12,710,000,000, including \$6,048,000,000 for defense in the past fiscal year. The expenditures were \$5,103,000,000 above income.

An official review of the fiscal year which ended Monday night showed huge increases in both expenditures and revenues over the preceding year, but made no mention of the program for the new year which includes \$22,269,000 of anticipated spending as a result of the defense program.

The treasury's direct debt jumped \$5,994,000,000 to a new high during the year, with the defense savings campaign barely under way. The year's borrowing included \$4,649,000,000 from the banks and public, and \$1,345,000,000 from various government trust funds, including the old age reserve fund.

In addition, government corporations, especially the reconstruction finance corporation, increased their debt—which is a contingent liability on the treasury—from \$5,532,000 to \$6,373,000,000. Part of this borrowing by corporations was for the purpose of making \$648,207,200 of capital repayments to the treasury under

Southern California's Quake Damage \$100,000

SANTA BARBARA, July 2.—(AP)—Estimates of southern California's quake damage ran as high as \$100,000 today after two minor after-tremors were reported here late yesterday.

Santa Barbara was shaken at 3:56 p. m. and at 4:15 p. m. yesterday as it was repairing damage from Monday night's strong tremor. Estimates of damage from broken glass, cracked plaster, two cracked buildings in Santa Barbara ranged to \$75,000, with \$25,000 damage in Carpinteria and Ventura.

War Vet Freed In Triangle Slaying

NAIROBI, Kenya Colony, July 2.—(AP)—Major Sir Henry Broughton, 57-year-old world war veteran, was acquitted by a jury amid applause today of a charge of murder in connection with the death of the Earl of Erroll, hereditary high constable of Scotland.

The earl, a widower, was found shot through the head in an automobile parked on a road last January 24, a few hours after he had left a dinner party attended by Sir Henry and his bride, Diana.

The couple was married in December at Durban, South Africa, and came to this British east African outpost for their honeymoon.

A police statement read to the court early in the trial quoted Sir Henry as saying his wife and the earl were in love and planned to marry once a divorce could be arranged.

Sir Henry and his bride made a pact before their wedding, the statement said, under which he agreed to leave his wife if they ever had differences. Sir Henry took a "philosophical" attitude toward the attachment between his bride and the earl when it became known to him, the statement said, adding he dropped a note from his bride into the grave of the earl.

Whites, Negroes Battle At Swimming Pool

PHILADELPHIA, July 2.—(AP)—Ducking of a 14-year-old negro by white youths at a swimming pool brought on race rioting which flared for hours during the night in teeming north Philadelphia. More than a score of persons were injured.

Fifty police cars and several hundred patrolmen rushed into the troubled zone in answer to six riot calls stemming from a free-for-all battle at the athletic recreation center pool used by whites and negroes at different times.

The pool is located between a negro community of 87,000 and a white section. Police Superintendent Howard P. Sutton reported ill feeling had existed since two negro life guards were assigned last week for full time duty.
