More Business—Less Profit

A TELEPHONE instrument is a little device. We seldom give it much notice except when it is in use. Somehow we just take it for granted that when the receiver is lifted from the hook a pleasant voice will say "number please?" We give the number desired, converse clearly and satisfactorily—and then hang up. The service is there. We can call a person in any city in the United States almost as easily as we can telephone our nearest neighbor—and the cost in either case is quite insignificant if the value and convenience of the service to our individual needs is considered.

As may easily be surmised all this excellent telephone service doesn't just happen. Back of the prompt "number please?" is a vast establishment consisting of wires, buildings, countless mysterious gadgets, a great financial structure—and stockholders.

For the space of this comment we are concerned with the latter for it was to the stockholders that N. R. Powley, president of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, issued a statement Tuesday which was sent out with the dividend checks. Earnings have been adversely effected due to a huge plant construction program he explained. Following is quoted a portion of Mr. Powley's statement:

"Throughout the entire Pacific coast we are making huge plant additions to meet the extraordinary service requirements involved in the defense preparedness and the accelerated tempo of business activity. Our working forces have been considerably increased in number and we now have in excess of 35,000 employees or over 5,000 more than a year ago. We have the highest payroll in the history of the company.

"Prior to the first of the year we estimated that our 1941 construction program would approximate \$60,000,000 of which an aggregate of \$48,000,000 would be exclusively for new construction. We now estimate that this program, which is still in a state of flux, will be in excess of \$70,000,000 and it will undoubtedly be enlarged due to the continued unusual and unforeseen extraordinary service demands.

"The present rate of telephone growth and increased volume of toll and long distance business, both at the highest level in the history of our company, are due in large part to defense preparedness and, as such, have assumed abnormal proportions. Current rate of earnings may be considered only as temporary.

"The preliminary earnings figures for the first six months' period of this year are undoubtedly not indicative of the rate of earnings which will be experienced for the entire year 1941. Substantial tax increases must be expected and no provision is included in the six months' statement for excess profits tax nor for an increase in federal income tax. Costs, inclusive of heavy increased wage expenses, are rapidly rising. The unprecedented additions to plant are materially increasing carrying charges which are not yet fully reflected in the earnings statement. All of these factors will inevitably result in higher expenses and lower net earnings."

An important point is brought out in the last paragraph of the above quotation. Apparently big business, as represented by the telephone company which is one

of the largest concerns on earth, will do a much larger volume of business as a result of defense activity—but will, in the final analysis, make less profit for stockholders than during normal or even depression times.

Information For Recreationists

(Forest Service Bulletin)

NORTH UMPQUA: All roads are in good condition with the exception of a short piece of rough road near Rock creek. The Copeland creek section will be open from July 3 to 6 inclusive, but will be impassable for heavy house trailers as this section is still unfinished. Trout fishing has been very good and several large catches have been made. Royal coachman seems to be the best fly. Steelhead fishing is poor.

DIAMOND LAKE: Roads are dusty, but in good condition. Fishing is fair in Diamond lake. Trout are the best lure. Deer are plentiful and can be seen from the roads.

BOHEMIA: All streams are normal, with fishing fair. Brice creek and Sharps creek roads are in good condition. Campgrounds on Brice creek and Layng creek roads have been prepared for Fourth of July visitors. Attention is called to the ban on fireworks inside the forest, and cooperation of forest visitors is requested.

SOUTH UMPQUA: Roads are in fair condition at lower elevations and, if the weather is good, nice picnicking will be found in several places over the holidays. Fishing in lakes is reported very good. Limit catches on flies are made with very little effort. Streams are in fair condition and stream fishing should be good.

Weather conditions have been unusually favorable, but a day or so of dry, warm weather will put the top litter of tree needles and debris in condition for fire to run, so the usual care with fire is urged, and again it is emphasized that fireworks and firecrackers are not permitted. May we please have the cooperation of all.

June Rainfall Here Above Average, Bureau Reports

Weather for the month of June was below normal in temperature and above the average in rain, fall, according to the monthly meteorological summary compiled by J. C. McCallister, in charge of the local office of the U. S. weather bureau.

The highest temperature of the month was 97 degrees on the 11th and the lowest was 43 degrees on the 2nd. The highest temperature ever recorded in June was 106 degrees and the lowest was 36 degrees. The temperature for the month was one-tenth of a degree below the daily average. However, since the first of January the temperature has had an average daily departure of 3.2 degrees above the average.

Precipitation for the past month was 2.59 inches, as compared with a normal of 1.69 inches for the month. The wet season, dating from September 1, 1940, however, shows a deficiency of 1.18 inches, while there is a rainfall shortage of 3.71 inches from the normal since January 1, 1941.

Elks Lodge Will Aid In Recruiting For U. S. Navy

The Roseburg Elks lodge will join with other lodges of the state in a campaign to aid the navy recruiting service. It was announced here today by Adrian Fisher, exalted ruler. Mr. Fisher has appointed a committee consisting of W. J. Omscheid, Carl E. Wimberly and Harris Ellsworth to direct the lodge's efforts.

The Elks lodges of the state are uniting in a drive to secure at least 140 men from the state of Oregon. This unit will be provided with special transportation service to the San Diego naval training station, and the group will be kept together as a training company.

The tremendous expansion in the navy has reached a point where the navy is becoming more and more pressed to fill enlistment quotas, the local lodge is informed. Navy officials report that, unlike the army, the navy does not take conscripts, basically because of the fact that a man-of-war cannot be trained in the short period of compulsory service now in effect. With the present highly mechanized and technical state of warships and aviation, the navy, it is stated, can not bridge this deficiency of men by lessening the high standards required for enlistment.

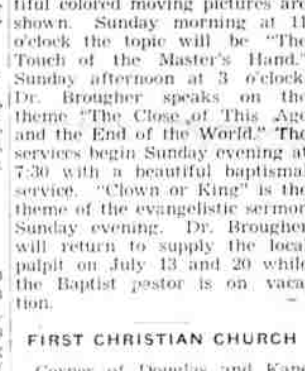
