

## RAF Lashes Rhineland, German Channel Bases

ser Prinz Eugen, raiding companion of the sunken Bismarck, were scored in a night raid on the harbor at Brest, the air ministry declared.

In the same sweep along the Nazi-held French coast the RAF was said to have blasted the U-boat base at Lorient, pouring explosives among moored submarines and damaging docks and buildings.

The ministry said other flights attacked docks at Cherbourg, railroad yards at Abbeville and Rhineland industrial targets.

## BRITISH TRYING TO CUT OFF SYRIA FROM TURKEY

VICHY, July 5.—(AP)—British forces were reported today to have reached the Syrian-Turkish frontier in a push along the railway from Mosul, cutting off the northeast corner of Syria.

Military dispatches to Vichy said the drive reached the frontier at Kamechle, but that the border town itself had not fallen.

A little farther south, British forces were reported encircling Dier-Ez-Zor. Two English-Indian divisions were said to be participating in the attack. (The British said they had taken this position.)

French military circles, considering the weight and force of the thrust into the northeast from Iraq, believed it designed as an eventual pincer movement in conjunction with the attack from the south.

The object of the drive would be to cut Syria off from Turkey.

ROME, July 5.—(AP)—Two air-launched torpedoes hit a British auxiliary cruiser of about 7,000 tons in Famagusta bay of the British Mediterranean island of Cyprus and the ship must be considered sunk, the Italian high command declared today.

Other Italian raiding planes bombed port facilities and ships in the harbor, the war bulletin reported.

## BUY OF U. S. COTTON SHOWS BRITISH SHIPPING BETTER

WASHINGTON, July 5.—(AP)—A sign of improvement in Britain's shipping situation was seen here today in a British notice to the department of agriculture that its exports to take at least 20,000 bales of cotton a month under the lend-lease act.

For months Britain, cramped for shipping space, has not bought cotton in this country and has restricted agricultural purchases to highly concentrated goods such as evaporated milk, cheese and dried eggs. Her announcement this week that she was prepared to take a minimum of 20,000 bales of cotton monthly came as a surprise to agricultural officials who had given up hope of disposing of any of the American staple soon to the United Kingdom.

The current market value of 20,000 bales is about \$1,350,000.

Britain's ability to transport that amount of cotton, observers said, could result only from shipping aid extended by the United States. They called attention particularly to the 2,000,000-ton shipping pool being assembled here to aid Great Britain and her allies.

BERLIN, July 5.—(AP)—German bombers started large fires in raids on Birmingham, in the midlands, Plymouth and other ports on the southeast English coast last night, the high command reported in a communique today.

British planes were said to have been defeated in an attempt to raid the channel coast yesterday, losing 13 planes to two German plane missing.

The communique also said British bombs destroyed the Canadian world war monument at Brest in attacks last night which caused little other damage.

## Germans Cross Bloody Berezina River, Report

part of the rout of Napoleon with variations. Napoleon's grand army was cut to pieces

on the bloody Berezina in its 1812 flight from Moscow. Now, the Germans are meeting fierce resistance there on the way to Moscow.

Not far east of the Berezina and the waterway system to the north which includes the Dnieper, the Stalin line—the red army's principal fortifications. By the German version, panzer columns which flanked France's Maginot line were rolling toward it for their major test against the might of the Soviet Union.

## Nazis Claim Successes

The Germans claim to have reached the Latvian frontier of old Russia after a march through Lithuania and Latvia, two of the Baltic states Russia had absorbed as a buffer zone. The Russians have acknowledged a recitation of their lines in the Latvian border region.

The Hitler command used the reiterative phrase, "operations... proceeding according to plan," and said that "several thousand prisoners had been taken in encounters between German reserves and scattered Russian detachments south of the Pinsk marshes."

A credit went to Hungarian forces for their report that Kolumba and Stanislawok in a southern sector of the great battle front had been captured.

A special Berlin communique said last night 20,000 more Soviet soldiers had surrendered in a pocket near Minsk, bringing to 180,000 the number of prisoners the nazis have claimed captured in the first two weeks of fighting.

The British disclosed today they had followed up military, naval, air and economic missions to Moscow with the dispatch of two experts to advise Moscow on civil defense against air raids.

Dispatches from Helsinki said today that German and Finnish forces had attacked the Soviet Russian base at Hangö, on the southwest coast of Finland, from the sea.

After fierce fighting the Russians, who obtained a long lease on the Hangö base after their brief 1939-40 war with Finland, were said to have withdrawn from several islands outside the fortress.

## Japan Prepares to Act

Halfway around the world, Japan disclosed she is considering an extension of her territorial waters which would cut off Russia's big Pacific port of Vladivostok from American war supplies. A Japanese spokesman declared yesterday that no decision had been reached.

In Shanghai and London, reports were heard that Japan, in a deal with the reich, was about to spring a new drive south—aimed at southern French Indo-China and perhaps Thailand—which would bring her forces closer to the British naval base at Singapore and to the Netherlands East Indies.

## MARKET REPORTS

### WOOL

BOSTON, July 5.—(AP)—The Commercial Bulletin said today:

"On Summer street, wool has been comparatively inactive this week. Some sales for limited quantities have been made at prices which show no change of moment both for fine and medium wools, chiefly the former

and mostly in domestic descriptions.

"In the west, activity has centered chiefly in Texas, where several buyers have taken fair weights of wool at firm rates, mostly equivalent to \$1.05, or slightly better, clean basis at eastern destination. Growers have been inclined to withdraw their wools from sale if bids were not fully up to recent prices.

"The manufacturers are waiting for the announcement of the awards on army goods for which bids were opened June 26. It is important to have a fair proportion of government business on the books in case priorities should be set up on raw materials.

"Foreign primary markets are quiet but firm. England has increased civilian wool rations by fifty per cent.

"Monair is quiet but steady."

Drownings, airplane crashes, shootings and other violent forms of death took an additional 82 lives, bringing the total fatalities with 23 as reported by 5 a. m. today.

Although an all-day rain curtailed holiday travel in most of the east, Pennsylvania led the nation in traffic deaths with 18. California led in total fatalities with 23. Ohio reported 22.

Last year's low record of only two deaths from fireworks was repeated, one such fatality occurring in Missouri and another at Connessville, Ind., where a pyrotechnical expert was killed at an authorized fireworks display.

Worst single tragedy was an automobile-train crash at the Long Island railroad's Mattituck, N. Y.,

grade crossing, where six automobile occupants were killed and a seventh critically injured. Deaths by states included: Washington 12, Oregon 7.
