register for voluntary service, the board will select those who have had civil training and experience to fit them to positions in home defense," Mr. Pinniger said. "Probably only a few of those who are registered will actually be made a part of the organization. However, if a large number of persons are registered, it will give the board a greater amount of information upon which to base selections and thus result in a more efficient organization."

Persons who register for service will be fingerprinted only in the event they are actually selected for service, Mr. Pinniger states.

Full Cooperation Urged.

"The defense council," the coordinator said, "is requesting the cooperation of every Douglas county resident in this registration. We want to locate every man and woman willing to give at least some time to the defense program. We do not know just what emergencies may arise, nor do we know how completely we will be called upon to organize. Therefore, it is important that we have a great number of people ready for service, so that we can have them available in the event the emergencies make a large organization necessary."

Mr. Pinniger left today for Reedsport to confer there with W. A. Burdick, member of the defense council and chairman for the Reedsport district. The conference was expected to include the heads of the American Legion post and Red Cross unit to work out plans for the inclusion of the Legion and Red Cross disaster unit in the defense organization.

American Naval Force Takes Over Iceland

which is a matter of broad policy clearly approved by the congress."

There was no indication of just what naval forces had moved into the north Atlantic island nor whether they would be supplemented by troops.

Mr. Roosevelt did not indicate, either, whether similar action might be taken against other possible stepping off points for a possible German attack on the western hemisphere.

But he has spoken of dangers which might be inherent in any nazi control of such points as Dakar on the west coast of Africa and of the Cape Verde and Azores islands, which are Portuguese, and the Canary islands, which are Spanish.

While the president has hesitated to draw a definite boundary line for the western hemisphere, some administration officials have said that Iceland was outside of the western hemisphere. The line of demarcation, as these sources outlined it, passed between Greenland and Iceland.

Now the United States for the first time has taken over the actual protective duties heretofore carried out by British troops. This will free the British for service elsewhere.

Mr. Roosevelt declared it to be "imperative that the approaches between the Americas should remain open and free from all hostile activity or threats."

The president said he consequently "issued orders to the navy that all necessary steps be taken to insure the safety of communications in the approaches between Iceland and the United States as well as on the seas between the United States and all other strategic outposts."

"This government," Mr. Roosevelt declared, "will insure the adequate defense of Iceland with full recognition of the independence of Iceland as a sovereign state."

"In my message to the prime minister of Iceland I have given the people of Iceland the assurance that the American forces sent there would in no way interfere with the internal and domestic affairs of that country, and that immediately upon the termination of the present international emergency all American forces will be at once withdrawn, leaving the people of Iceland and their government in full and sovereign control of their own territory."

CHEHALIS, Wash., July 7.—(AP)—Officers seeking a motive for the slaying on the Fourth of July of 14-year-old Daniel Russell by his brother, James, 20-year-old part-time post office employee, worked on the theory today it might have been a "mercy killing." The brothers were orphans.

Prosecutor John Panesko said James confessed he shot his brother through the head with a shotgun but gave no reason for his act.

The prosecutor and Sheriff J. D. Compton said, however, they had learned that the younger brother had been in ill health and that this had preyed upon James' mind.

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Ecuador, Peru Renew War Over Frontier Dispute

QUITO, Ecuador, July 7.—(AP)—Ecuador charged Peru with political and military aggression today after a week-end of bombing raids and border fighting growing out of a century-old frontier dispute.

Steadily-mounting reports told of two days of sporadic garrison battles, artillery shelling of frontier towns by Peruvian troops, and Peruvian bomb raids on Ecuador's military outposts.

The ministry of defense issued a communique blaming the outbreak on a penetration of Ecuadorian territory by Peruvian soldiers and civilians.

A Peruvian source was quoted as saying Ecuador was trying anew to win a favorable solution to her territorial claims by dragging Peru into mediation which previously had stalled.
