ASTORIA, Ore., July 8.—(AP)—Salt water proved an effective substitute for surgery, an X-ray plate revealed today.

John Rush Harper, 3-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank B. Harper of Spokane, was playing on Cannon beach, where he had been taken to gain strength for removal of a common pin from a lung.

The child dug a hole and when the water welled up, took a drink. He started to cough, his mother pounded him on the back, and the pin dropped to the sand.

The X-ray confirmed Mrs. Harper's belief that it was the pin that had been in the lung for several months.
