Of all the parables that Jesus spoke the most difficult to understand for the average reader is that of the "Unjust Steward." This parable has baffled many Bible students and led some of them into strange bypaths. This parable tells of a steward or overseer who had grown careless and was about to lose his position. Facing a crisis, he used his wits and feathered his nest by a clever, though dishonest practice. He called on his employer's creditors and discounted heavily what they owed him, thus making the creditors his friends, from whom he would expect favors when his position was gone. Jesus commended the unrighteous steward because he had done wisely, for the sons of this world are wiser in their generation than the sons of light. Jesus instanced the foresight of this dishonest steward as worthy of the consideration of those who are committed to standards of honesty and wholesome living, but fail to function successfully. He used it as a sort of a rebuke to the good citizen who fails to do his duty and yet pretends to the world to assume his responsibility in life. Amen.

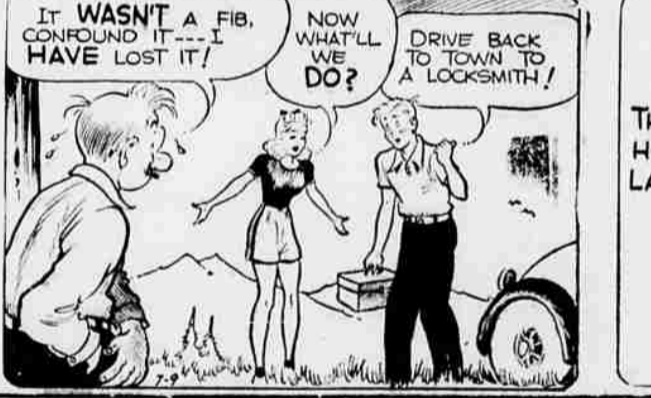

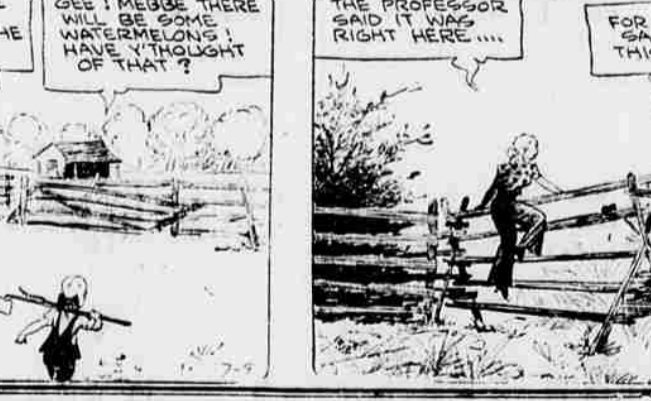

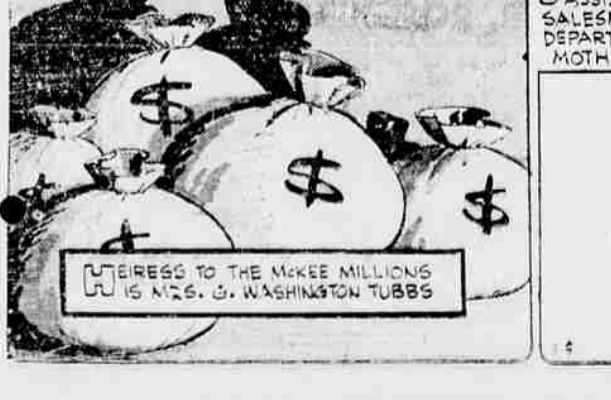
